# More power approved for fairgrounds

The Goodland Star-News A new electrical service will power grills and stoves for concession sales in the pit area at the fairgrounds, Sherman County commissioners decided last Tuesday.

The Sherman County Racing Association had asked commissioners to find a way increase power to the pit area because the concession vendor was blowing breakers.

The commissioners talked to electricians in February about extending the service from the arena, but decided that would not provide enough power.

Vendor Harold Snethen told the commissioners there was not enough power to handle the pit lights and his equipment.
