However, many citizens of northwest Kansas do not know that Goodland was once a major livestock market center. The Goodland News-Republic in a 1931 spring report gave such an account.

A MARKET CENTER Buyers From National Markets Come to Goodland Now

Goodland has so rapidly developed into a livestock market center that buyers from big companies from national markets are being attracted to the weekly auctions held here every Friday.

Last Friday, representatives of Denver and Omaha livestock commission companies attended the sale here, and a representative of the Omaha Stockyards Company was also here.

These men not only are on hand to buy offerings of livestock from they bring up-to-the-minute infor-
