Though she faced struggles, Perkins said, she is grateful her parents brought her to Kansas.

"I'm glad my parents had the courage to find a better life for their children," she said, "and they taught us to work hard."

She is the oldest of nine — eight of them survive — all Garden City High School graduates.

Perkins stressed the importance of education and of giving back to the community. Quoting painter Thomas Kinkade, she said, "We make the best contributions in areas in which our hearts call us to serve."

Perkins met her husband while he was a paramedic and she was a billing clerk at the same hospital. After they were married and had kids, both decided to further their education.

He got a medical degree, and she became a teacher, but it did not come easy.

"There were times my husband and I wanted to quit, give up," she said. "It took a lot of dedication, a lot of late nights."

Today, Harold Perkins is a family physician, and the couple has five children, 13 to 21.

Mrs. Perkins said the Board of Regents is keenly aware of its responsibilities, which include providing a high quality of education for Kansas students.
