Progress 75 years ago was in skies over Goodland

For signs of progress in Northwest Kansas 75 years ago, one had to look to the skies over Goodland. The airport was a refueling stop between Denver and Kansas City, which in turn opened up the opportunity for air mail service in June 1931.

AIR MAIL TO **START FRIDAY Can Send Letters With Pilot**

Everything is ready for the opening of the air mail line from Kansas City to Denver by the United States Airways, flying through here. Salina will be the only mail stop on the line at the opening, requests of other towns, including Goodland, to be made mail stops having been turned down. The first trips are to be made Friday.

Since the planes will stop here to refuel, Goodland people can get the advantage of fast delivery of their letters by securing air mail stamps and giving their letters to the pilots of the ships to be mailed at some of the regular mail stations, according to B.E. Bridges, vice-president of the air line.
