# Board pays for air conditioning from capital outlay

At the Goodland School Board meeting on Monday, June 12 the board was presented three ways to pay for the air conditioning for West Elementary School.

They could pay the entire amount out of capital outlet or do a lease purchase with a local bank for two or three years. A lease purchase is a loan from the bank and the school district pays it off within a period of
