

Elks K-18 loses to Oberlin 16-12

The Goodland Elks K-18 baseball team came out hitting and scoring Monday, but they was no match for an Oberlin team that won 16-12 on its home field.

Thursday, Goodland played the Colby No. 2 team at Memorial Field. They meet the Colby No. 1 team on Monday at Memorial Field in the final game of the regular season.

Monday, Goodland had a 5-3 lead at the end of the first inning. Oberlin cut the lead to 8-7 in the second. Goodland scored two runs in the third to one by Oberlin to build a 10-8 lead.

However, Goodland didn't score again until the sixth, and by then Oberlin had scored one in the fourth and four in the fifth to lead 13-10. Goodland added two runs in the sixth on a home rune by Brandon Rome that scored Kevin Amthor after he hit a single. Goodland threatened to add more. Ben Waugh got a single with two outs. Adam Duell got a single and stole second, but Waugh was caught trying to take home on a passed ball to end the threat.

Oberlin answered with three runs in the bottom of the sixth.

Goodland's Dillon Trachsel had a single in the fifth, but hit one to the shortstop in the seventh for the first out. David Murray got a single, and was out on a fielder's choice by Michael Pettibone. Johnson flied out to left to end the game and give Oberlin the win, 16-12.

Rome was the starting pitcher for Goodland, but he was replaced at the bottom of the second after giving up seven runs. Rome gave up two hits, but walked five of the batters he faced and hit two more.

Cameron Morris came in to replace. Morris gave up nine runs on

seven hits. He walked one batter and hit two batters.

Goodland had a triple from Vance Johnson in the first plus singles by Amthor and Morris to score five runs. Johnson, Amthor, Rome, Morris and Waugh scored for Goodland.

Oberlin had six errors. Goodland had nine hits and 22 errors with six in the first, five in the second, three in the third, one in the fourth, four in the fifth and three in the sixth.. The team left 14 men on base.

The loss gives the Goodland a 8-2 record, with both losses on the road.

American Legion splits with Colby

The Goodland American Legion baseball team played its last game before the zone tournament in Colby, winning one and losing one.

In the first game, Goodland gave up six unearned runs in a losing cause, 4-8. The losing pitcher was Torrie Elder.

The defense tightened up in the second game, with Goodland only giving up two unearned

runs, while scoring two themselves. Wyatt Dautel picked up another victory, 3-2.

The team finished the season with a record of 8-13.

The zone tournament begins on Sunday in Osborne.

Steever Water Park to get heat pump system

The cost per unit is \$2,585, and the total project would cost about \$40,000 he said.

"I can't see any other way to go," Hill said.

Each pump has to have a power panel, and Bandel said they would have to wait for them to be made and delivered.

Hill said the life span is expected to be 10 years, but the pumps might last longer.

"I think you will get more years out of this," Billinger agreed.

City Commissioner Josh Dechant said it sounded like a good alternative to the boiler, but he wondered how the firm had determined that eight pumps would handle the water park when it took nine for the

pool in Minden?

Hill said it was based on the study of the Goodland climate.

Simon said when the pad is poured for the pumps, he would recommend setting it up so two more heat pumps could be added.

"We do have some money we can spend for this," Hill said. "The electrical is the biggest drawback to get it in.

"We want to do it in a timely manner and be sure it is done right."

Commissioner Dave Daniels asked if the heat pumps would use the existing water lines and circulating pumps.

"Yes," Simon said. "We will come right out of the wall, and the existing pumps are adequate to handle the pressure to get the water through the system."

Bandel said getting the power for each pump would cost \$1,500 to \$2,000 for all of the parts. He said the transformer would need to be upgraded because if all eight came on at once, it would push the existing transformer to it limits.

"I am in favor of doing it right," City Commissioner Annette Fairbanks said, "and I am sure people will survive until it is ready."

Billinger said he thought the city could see 60 to 80 percent savings over the cost of natural gas once the system is installed.

"Do what you can do to show people we are working on this," Billinger said. "If it doesn't get in this year, we would be ready for next year."

"Do we want to heat the water park?" Daniels asked

"I think it affects the number of people who use it," Fairbanks replied.

"Our climates are different," Billinger said, "even 30 miles away in Colby. I think we are closer to Denver and that climate."

Simon said with the new system, the pumps could be turned on in the spring, and maybe shut off in the middle of summer.

"There will be times when you have to run all eight to bring the temperature back up," Simon said. "Having a pool cover could help in the future."

"Give me the authority to do it and we will get it going," Hill said.

"I think we are all in agreement to go ahead," Billinger said.

City Clerk Mary Volk said there was money in the reserve fund.

Certified Folder puts the brochures in racks around the region. Price said it was time to redo the contract. It costs \$3,500 for a spot in the racks. The company has racks from Limon to Kansas City.

"It's pricy but important," Price said.

Consolidated Printing will print 15,000 of the Sherman County/ Goodland Guide. They will sell ads so it should not cost anything to print that amount but if the board wanted 30,000 they will need to pay for the extra 15,000.

Cindy Bowman, co-owner of

Bowman Heating and Air Conditioning, said she especially wanted to see more done on the Van Gough painting than was in the last one.

Consolidated should be done selling ads in two weeks to a month. Price said it needs to be done in time for the trade shows.

Ads for Kansas Getaway Guide will be done for two years this time, Price said.

"We budgeted \$4,000 for it, but it will cost \$6,000 if we do a half page plus our part of the Kansas I-70 Association's page," she said.

The second year will have a new cover and schedule of events. The

guide circulation is 700,000, Price said.

"We usually do the half page, but I suggest we just go with the Kansas I-70 Association's full page ad," she said.

K-27 grading work begins south of city

of K-27, and had questions about access and estimated time lines for when the work would be near their property.

Dirk and Pam Sheldon talked to Epley and Oelschlager about how close the road comes to their home, and ways to save some of the trees.

Rodney Haeffner, who lives on the west side of K-27, was at the meeting to ask Oelschlager if the new road work will help with some drainage problems near his house.

Max Linin, who lives on the west side of K-27, talked to Oelschlager about timing of the work.

Chriss McDiffett, northwest Kansas district engineer from Norton, said the K-27 project is one of the last large projects in the district included in the current state highway program. The project is estimated to cost \$14.5 million, plus \$2.5 million for a new Smoky Hill River bridge completed in November.

Oelschlager was asked about the tie-in section on the south edge of the city. This will be one of the last sections to be paved, he said, and a

shoo-fly detour will move traffic around the construction zone.

Epley said he expects the section on the edge of town to begin in early September.

Grading of the south part of the project is expected to begin in March. The north project section is expected to be ready for paving by spring and the total project is to be completed by November 2007.
