Three head to Shrine Bowl

The 33rd annual Kansas Shrine Bowl will kick off shortly after 6 p.m. (Mountain Time) Saturday, July 29, in Carnie Smith Stadium at Pittsburg State University.

Goodland’s Mark Starr will play for the West Team and be wearing No. 76. This will mark the third straight year a former Cowboy has played in the game. Jordan Bedore played in 2004 and Brock Lohr played last year in Manhattan. Bedore now plays for the Wildcats of Kansas State while Lohr will play for the Gorillas of Pittsburg State.

Starr is headed to Colorado State University in Fort Collins this fall to play football for the Rams.

His mother, Brenda, said her son has been practicing with the Rams, but was to return to Goodland Monday and after a few days at home will head to St. John’s Military

School in Salina, where the West Team begins practice on Friday.

Colorado State opens its season on Sept. 2 with a home game against Weber State University of Utah.

As a high school senior, Starr was a first-team All-Northwest Kansas League selection as a defensive lineman and a second-team pick at offensive tackle. He made the second team in both positions as a jun-

ior, and was a first-team pick at both as a sophomore.

Two other Northwest Kansas League players will join Starr on the West sidelines: Oakley’s Calder Keller and Hoxie’s Toliver Bird. Keller was a first-team all-league choice as a running back, defensive back and specialty teams. Bird was a first-team pick at linebacker.

Hoxie’s John Petrie will be one of six coaches for the West Team this year. Petrie guided the Indians to an 8-4 season last year, making it to the state Class 2-1A quarterfinals.

Two Goodland High musicians

will play in this year’s Masonic All-Star Marching Band. Clarinetist Lea Shores and trombone player Tanner Oharah will be in Pittsburg next Tuesday for band camp.

The 225-member band lead a morning parade on game day and will play during halftime.

Public television, channel 2 on both Eagle Cable and S&T, will broadcast the game live with the pregame show starting at 5 p.m. (Mountain Time).

Money from the game helps support Shriners’ Hospitals for Children, a 22-facility network that provides free orthopedic, burn and spinal cord care for children.

Goodland explodes in third, wins

The Goodland Elks K-18 baseball team fell behind the Colby No. 2 team, 2-1, in the first inning Thursday, but Goodland exploded for 18 runs in the third to lead by 15, and went on to win 21-6.

Brandon Rome was the winning pitcher, giving up three hits, striking out three, walking six and hitting one batter in three innings.

Colby jumped out to a 2-1 lead in the first with runs scored by Jarrett Marker and Ethan Stickel. Goodland’s run in the first was scored by Vance Johnson.

Goodland tied things up at 3-3 in the second with runs by Ben Waugh and David Murray. Colby’s run was scored by Nathan Quagliano.

Colby regained the lead with three runs in the top of the third, scored by Brandon Gordon, Adam Weber and Sam Kendrick.

Gordon, the starting pitcher for Colby, was replaced in the third after giving up eight runs. Kale Arnberger faced 14 Goodland batters and gave up nine more runs. Arnberger was replaced by Sam Kendrick, who gave up a single to Waugh.

Camron Morris led off for Goodland in the bottom of the third; he was hit by a pitch. Morris advanced to second when Adam Duell drew a walk. The runners advanced on a passed ball and Morris scored on a single by Murray.

That opened the floodgates, as Goodland batted around twice with every player scoring at least one run and most two. Goodland scored 18 runs with only two outs and 25 at bats.

Waugh, Morris, Duell and Murray each scored three runs. Johnson and Dillon Trachsel scored two, Kevin Amthor had three singles and scored two runs, Rome and Keagen Smith each scored one run.

The game was called after the third inning when Goodland had a 15-run lead.

Goodland had 11 hits and six errors, with three in the first and three in the second, but none in the third. Colby had three hits and 22 errors with 15 in the third.

The Elks K-18 team is made up of 13 to 15 year-old players with Gary Smith, veterinarian at

Prairieland Animal Clinic, coaching, and Rod Kling and Steve Duell, both farmers, assisting.

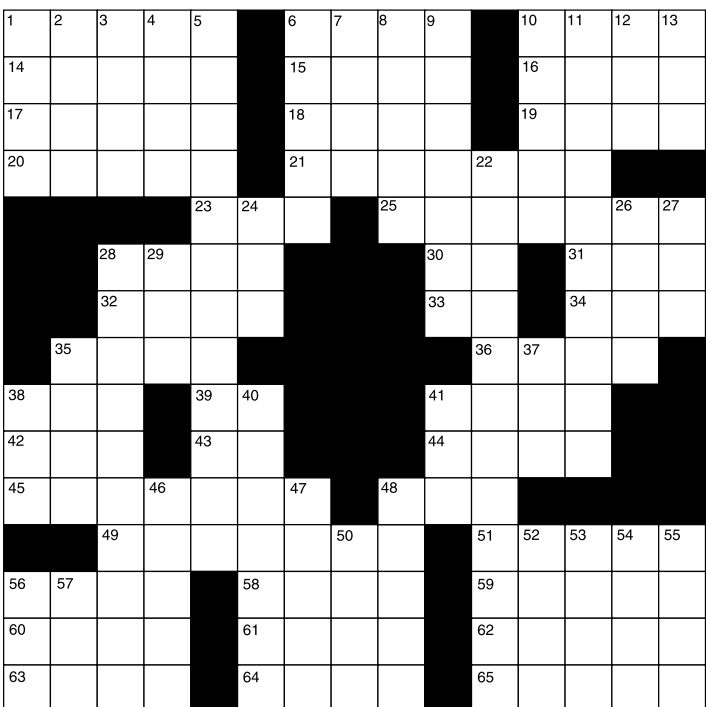
The first game the Goodland team played against Colby No. 1, at Memorial Field on June 2, was called due to rain in the top of the second inning. That game was rescheduled to Monday as the final game of the regular season. The Goodland team lost the second game against Colby No. 1 on July 6

in Colby, 9-1.

The regional playoffs will be Friday to Sunday in Russell. The first- and second-place teams from each league go to regionals. If they do well there, the state tournament is Friday through Sunday, July 28-Aug. 1, at Lucas.

The Goodland team has an 9-3 record, and Friday headed west across the border to play a non-league game with Burlington.
