College to sell house Sunday

You may never have a chance to buy a better house at a better price with large closets. Network hookthan Sunday, when a home built by carpentry students of the Northwest Kansas Technical College last year will be sold at auction.

The auction will start at 10 a.m. in front of the house, on East 13th Street across the street from the Larry Keirns Fitness Center on the college campus. It will be conducted by Terry Richardson from Homestead Realty and Auction.

The house features oak trim throughout and heavy insulation. Built by students last year, it has 1,676 square feet with a "silent" Ibeam floor system, R-19 insulation in the walls and R-50 in the ceiling. It features a large living room with cathedral ceiling.

The kitchen pantry has large canned-goods storage area with interchangeable sliding shelf systems and Formica countertops with oak edging. The master suite includes a bathroom with jetted tub and "hisand-her" basins. The main bathroom includes a large tub/shower Mader, Oakley; Tryler Nicolaus, combination.

The house has three bedrooms ups for phone, Internet and cable run throughout the house. The college has the house priced at \$105,000.

This year's house was to have been on the block, too, but it sold at an open house on Sunday to a couple from Russell Springs for around \$100,000. It was 1,664 square feet with the same I-beam floor system and insulation.

Both of the houses were built by students. The heating and ventilation department installed Lennox heating and air conditioning. McClure Plumbing and Heating of Goodland installed the plumbing. The city building inspector inspected the homes, and all construction meets or exceeds building

Bricks arrive Tuesday, bricklayers Aug. 1

The Goodland Star-News Bricks for the five intersections on Main should arrive Tuesday, and city commissioners were told on Monday that the bricklayers would begin on Aug. 1.

Darin Neufeld, engineer for Evans, Bierly, Hutchison and Associates, handling the city street projects, said the first intersection to get new bricks will be Ninth and Main.

Neufeld said Mike Miller of Miller Construction told him the concrete work has basically been completed at four of the intersections, and once the new storm drains are installed at 11th, concrete work can begin there.

Bricklaying at Ninth and Main should be completed by the Alumni Reunion on Aug. 11-12, Neufeld

Neufeld said there is some hope that the company laying the bricks would bring two crews, and then work could be done at Ninth and 13th before the reunion.

It takes about a week to lay each intersection, Neufeld said.

After the meeting, Neufeld said he had talked to Aaron Duell of the 4-H Ambassadors and recommended the fair parade July 29 use Broadway this year.

Boys arrested; car found on I-70

A missing car found on I-70 west of Goodland and tips from a Burlington convenience store and a driver near Denver led to the arrest of two 16-year-old boys wanted for a murder near Kansas City.

The boys, from Grain Valley, Mo., are being held in Denver. They are being charged in the fatal stabbing of one boy's mother Saturday.

Grain Valley Police Chief Aaron Ambrose said Wednesday afternoon the two would be charged with murder, criminal assault and armed criminal action.

The boys were identified by Denver police as Taylor Marquez, the victim's son, and Edward George, both of whom would have been juniors at Grain Valley High School this fall.

Pamela Marquez, 39, was killed Saturday night in a bedroom of the family's home. Her husband, Joe Marquez, an assistant U.S. Attorney, was cut.

A media alert in Kansas and Colorado issued Saturday night said police were looking for Marquez's 16year-old son and a friend, and both were believed to be

A Colorado State Patrol trooper found a black 2001 Chevrolet Impala driven by the two boys about 8:25 a.m. Monday morning on I-70 a few miles west of the state line. The car was on the westbound shoulder with
