Hospital buys surgical table

School district benefits from court ruling

The Goodland Star-News The Goodland School District can finish its salary negotiations with the teachers and its budget for the coming school year now that the Kansas Supreme Court dismissed a lawsuit on the school finance bill.

The district will have more money, about a quarter of a million dollars, but most of it comes with strings attached; it's earmarked for specific programs.

For the 2005-2006 school year, said Marvin Selby, former superintendent and financial advisor for the Goodland schools, the district got \$6,481,052 from the state, an average of \$6,436 per student. The official enrollment was 1,007 as of Sept. 20. If the enrollment stays the same, he said, the total next year would be \$6,759,052, or \$6,712 per student.
