Daily Bible reading reveals gems of knowledge from God

In the Tuesday, Dec. 27, issue of The Goodland Star-News, my column contained a schedule for reading the entire Bible in a year. If you have managed to keep up with the schedule despite a busy year, you have gleaned many fine gems from the Bible's knowledge, examples and exhortations.

I would like to point out a few of the fine points from the books of Esther, Job and Psalms.

If you have kept up with the Bible reading, they will be a nice review. If you haven't, perhaps knowing what you missed with motivate you to work Bible reading into your schedule.

one — Job was not an Israelite, whom God had chosen as his people, but he was a righteous man, and God saw fit to record his acts of faith.

Do you ever feel like life is picking on you? That your problems just keep piling up? Then you can relate to Job's experience, and you can learn from how he



reacted to problems.

Job 1:13-19 tells of calamities that befell Job. If you notice that it starts by saying his sons and daughters were eating at their brother's house, and that is repeated in verse 18, you can see that all these things happened in a matter of hours.

Job's cattle and she-asses were The account of Job is a unique stolen and their attendants killed, his sheep and their attendants were eaten up by fire, his camels were Job with a malignant boil from the stolen and their attendants killed, and his son's house fell and killed all his children.

Verse 20 shows that Job was deeply grieved by the events, but his response in verse 21 showed that he shows an incredibly good attidid not become bitter toward God: tude: "Shall we accept merely "Naked I came out of my mother's what is good from the true God

I return there. God himself has given, and God himself has taken away. Let the name of God continue to be blessed."

Reading the begin-

ning verses in chapters 1 and 2 gives us the background of why these things happened to Job: Satan challenged God, claiming that Job only served Him for what he could get. God allowed Satan to take those things away, giving Job the opportunity to prove Satan wrong.

Satan was not done: chapter 2, verse 7 says, "So Satan went away from the person of God and struck sole of his foot to the crown of his head.'

In verse 9, Job's wife tells him: "Curse God and die!"

Job's response in verse 10

Job still had to deal with three false comforters, fake friends who blamed him, telling Job he must have done something to displease God and to deserve what happened to him.

Chapter 42 tells us that God rewarded Job for his faith, restoring all he had lost and then some. Verse 12 says, "As for God, he blessed the end of Job afterward more than his beginning."

The book of Esther is named after a Jewish orphan who became the queen of Persia. By accepting advice from her older cousin Mordecai and having the courage to approach the king, though doing so could have cost her life, she saved the Jews from a plot to eradicate them.

Psalms is the inspired songbook of God's ancient worshippers. They include songs of praise and prayers of supplication for mercy and help, expressions of thanksgiving, prophecies and instruction.

Children may worry a little or a lot about school, friends and family issues. But for a child or adolescent with Obsessive-Compulsive Disorder, their worries cause severe discomfort and interfere with dayto-day functioning, schoolwork and relationships with friends and fam-

Obsessions are recurrent and persistent thoughts, impulses or images that are unwanted and cause marked anxiety or distress. These are frequently unrealistic or irrational and not simply excessive worries about real-life problems or preoccupations.

Obsessive thoughts may vary with the age of the child and may change as the child gets older. Com- to be sure all the doors at home are

For example, younger children with the disorder may have persistent thoughts that something bad is going to happen to them or to a family member. To relieve that anxiety, the child may compulsively check locked before going to bed.

If the anxiety continues, the child will check the locks over and over. An older child or teen-
