

Canvass will confirm commissioner race winner

can nomination for the Kansas House of Representatives in District 123 in Garden City. He lost with 42 percent of the vote to 58 percent for Jeff Whitham, a member of the family that owns Western State Bank in Garden City and Goodland.

In the Republican race for governor, Dr. Jim Barnett of Emporia won statewide at 36 percent; he had 40 percent in Sherman County.

In the Democratic race for the

Secretary of State between Robert Beattie and state Sen. David Haley, a nephew of "Roots" author Alex Haley, Beattie has 34,779 votes and Haley 35,090. On the Republican side, incumbent Secretary of State Ron Thornburg and Insurance Commissioner Sandy Praeger won easily despite conservative challenges.

Republican and Democratic committee positions are decided at the primary.

In Ward 1, the Republicans elected Jeff Mason with 113 votes and Rob-

erta Bretz 90, who defeated Marilyn Mangus 36. In Ward 2, Curtis Duncan had 63 and Janet Craft 50 to defeat Garnet Haifleigh with 14. In Ward 3, Travis Witman had 97 and Roxanne Yonkey 94. In Ward 4, Judy Vignery with 99 defeated Micki Scherling 82 for committee woman. Lois Crossman was elected in Grant Township with 15, Harlan House with 88 and Cora House 89 in Itasca and Danny and Cheryl Traub, both with 10, in Lincoln.

Todd Quenzer with 2 lost to Ron Schilling with 7 in Llanos and

Bronwyn Quenzer with 2 was defeated by Marsha Schilling with 7. Andrew House with 23 defeated Max Linin with 19 in Logan. Carol Topliff had 38 as committee woman.

Shirley Anderson with 10 was elected McPherson Township clerk with Elmer with 9 and Joyce Purvis with 10 as committee man and woman. Lou Taylor with 13 won as Stateline Township clerk with Scott Hooker with 10 and Karen Hooker with 11 as committee man and woman. Allen and Doris Quenzer

both with 17 will be the Republican committee man and woman in Union.

Myron Tedford with 25 defeated Keith Coon with 17 in Voltaire and Penelope Tedford with 22 with defeated Judith Coon with 18 for the committee woman. L.J. Owens and Sondra Owens with 19 each will represent Washington.

On the Democratic side, Cynthia Strnad with 33 was elected in Ward 1 and Randy Daise with 3 in Grant Township.

County delays signing road contract

In other business, the commissioners:

- Heard from County Treasurer Iris Scheopner that she is getting a computer set up in her office to allow people to pay property taxes with debit and credit cards. Rasure asked who would pay the fee, the customer or the county? Scheopner said there would be a fee charged to the customer.
- She said her office is doing car tags that way now, and there is a fee to the customer. Scheopner said she will have stickers in the office that explain what cards can be accepted and the fees to be charged. County Clerk Janet Rumpel asked when the new procedure will start.
- "As soon as I can get the computer set up," Scheopner said.
- Thomas said it sounded like a good plan.
- Discussed imposing a burn ban. Tiede said a recent rain that covered nearly the whole county had helped. The commissioners decided to look at a ban again when they meet on Aug. 8.
- Received information from Alex West about the Sherman County Speedway races so far this year. West was asking for help from the county on the Flatlander Fall Festival races to be held on Sept. 22-23.

The commissioners told West they would consider doing the same thing as last year. Over the past two years, the county has helped the racing association with the electrical costs for the Flatlander races, but did not waive the basic rental fee of \$500.

Thomas asked West if he had found new cable to put in front of the grandstands. West said he had contacted Midwest Energy, but they use 7/16 cable, and it is 5/8 the insurance company wants.

- Heard a request to use right-of-way along County Road 62 for a high pressure gas line that will run east of County Road 17 across K-27 and tie into a tap on Briney's land east of town.

Dean Jarrett of Rosewood Resources from Yuma, Colo., said the company will be developing a new set of wells east of K-27. He said the company had drilled three wells east of the highway, and they were good.

He said the company plans to have another rig moved into the area in about two weeks. He said they would be drilling horizontal wells from now to the end of the year. Jarrett said he has been able to get easements from all but one landowner, who owns 720 feet along Road 62. Jarrett said the company was able to get landowners to agree to all but one-half mile for the other

gas line that the company ran along County Road 57 last year.

Rasure said the county would do the same as in the past, advising that Rosewood should work with the landowners, but can use county right-of-way if it is the last resort. Jarrett said he would tell his people to keep trying to get permission, but if not he would submit the right-of-way documents to the county. He said he does not expect the gas line to be laid until September.

- Received a draft copy of protocols for rural firemen to do emergency medical treatment of victims at fire scenes. Goodland Rural Fire Chief Alan David called the commissioners to talk about the draft.

Rasure asked who had received copies, and David said he had met with Bruce Gleason, county ambulance director, and that Dr. Kenneth Austin, the fire department's medical director, had signed off on the procedures.

"Have they all seen copies?" Rasure asked.

"No," David said. "Wanted you to see them first, and then get them sent out to everybody else."

Tiede said David should send copies to Gleason, hospital administrator Jay Jolly and Dr. Austin.

"We cannot approve anything until everybody has seen it and had their input," Rasure said.

The procedures are being re-

quired by the county's insurance carrier, the Kansas Counties Association Multi-line pool.

Rasure said the county would send a copy of the draft to the insurance carrier in Topeka. He called Tom Jones, an insurance company representative, and told him what the county was doing about the medical procedure protocols. The carrier had given the county until Aug. 1 to draft and approve the procedures. Jones told Rasure that he would grant the county an extension because they were working on the procedures and would review the draft.

The commissioners will meet at 8 a.m. on Friday to canvass the primary election votes. Rumpel said she does not know how long it will take with the new machines and procedures.

The commissioners agreed to meet at 1:30 p.m. on Friday to have a work session on the budget for next year.

deficits in the sewer, water and electric funds.

To balance the budget, the commissioners split the replacement air conditioning at the library over two years for a savings of \$37,500 this year, and told Fire Chief Scott Gilmer to find a smaller pumper truck to avoid having to build at \$50,000 building to hold a big one.

The commissioners did include

\$7,000 for new hydraulic extraction equipment for the fire department's rescue truck.

Hill said the budget includes a 5 percent increase in pay for merit raises, and a hike for the volunteer firemen from \$20 a run to \$22.

"The city employees are exceptional and go above and beyond in their efforts to make this a good city," said Wayne Hill, who has been city manager for about a year. "Being a city employee is not al-

ways easy, and they deserves a pat on the back and a nod for the good things they do."

Hill said the budget includes money to match several grants the city is working on.

The commission meets at 5 p.m. in the commission room on the second floor of the City Administration Building, 204 W. 11th. To enter, push the button on the west wall inside the first set of doors.
