University placed ninth in the Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletics Association football coaches' preseason poll while the Lady Tigers volleyball team was picked eighth.

Fort Hays State joined the Mid-America conference on July 1 after nearly 40 years in the Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference. The league has 10 teams, including all four NCAA Division II schools in Kansas The other six are in Missouri.

For football, Northwest Missouri State University, last season's national runner-up, was picked No. 1 with five first-place votes. The Gorillas of Pittsburg State University,

The FBI credits the Fleagle case as the first time a single fingerprint was used to identify and convict criminals.

The Fleagle Gang robbed banks in Larned, Kinsley, Marysville, Ottawa and McPherson Kan., Lamar, Colo., Eugene, Ore., and countless others of over \$1 million in the 10 years they operated.
