Thunderstorm warning issued as tornado lands

Colby Free Press It was just few moments after the National Weather Service in Goodland issued a severe thundertornado landed on Colby's south

"There was almost no warning," said Thomas County Emergency Management Director Jim Engel.

The National Weather Service was warning Thomas County residents of a thunderstorm. No tornado was expected.
