Ennis House added to National Register of Historic Places

The Goodland Star-News It has been the site of Victorian high teas, Fourth of July barbecues, benefit garage sales and a display of World War II memorabilia.

Restoration has included painting the outside and replacing the porch railings, gingerbread trim and doors.

Now the Ennis House, also known as the Handy House, at 202 W. 13th, is on the National Register of Historic Places. It was added to the state registry in May 2004 following an application process that lasted more than a year. Then the process for adding it to the national registry began.

Now the house is protected by the Kansas Historic Preservation Act, and federal projects that might harm the house must be reviewed, said

Jennie Chinn, state historic preservation officer.

Buildings on the national register are eligible for a 20 percent federal investment tax credit if they are rehabilitated for income-producing purposes. A25 percent Kansas State Rehabilitation Tax Credit is available for improvements. The house also qualifies for the Heritage Trust ample of Queen Anne architecture, grant program.

The state Historical Society offers free technical advice to owners of National Register properties to help them maintain their properties in a historically accurate manner.

It has taken a lot of work by a lot of people to get the house on the National Register, said David Branda, president of the Sherman County Historical Society.

2001 with help from a \$50,000 state Attraction Development Grant to preserve it and develop it as a tourist attraction. Over the last five years, it has used the house to display and preserve Sherman County history.

Boyd said she sent the initial application for the state registry in November 2002, a revised version in June 2003, and the final draft in May 2004. A lot of research was required to document the history of the home and its owners and the architecture.

The county group had to have permission even to apply for the state registry. Evelyn Ward, former president of the society, got the initial approval to pursue putting the house on the registry, Boyd said, and Lloyd Holbrook, a later president of the society, worked on it as well.
