Lawrence man finds 18-foot ancient fish fossil

Colby Free Press A Lawrence man is trying to have a prehistoric fish fossil he found last month in Logan County declared the state's "official fossil."

Alan Deitrich, 58, who returned earlier this week from hunting fossils in China, says he is working to find the Xiphactinus Audax a permanent home.

'My grandpa used to say cream rises to the top," Deitrich said, "and it's the good stuff that rises to the top and ends up in a museum.'

Deitrich unearthed the 18-foot Xiphactinus Audax in July in the chalk beds south of Oakley. He said heavy equipment owned by Jay and Arlo Sporer of Sporer Land Development made it possible to unearth all of the fish except the tail. How old the fossil is has not been determined.

The fossil is currently on a trailer in front of First Travel Inn, owned by Jim and Donna Smith of Oakley,

waiting to be taken to a museum for sil. display.

Audax of Logan County is the largest one unearthed at one time in the history of paleontology. Calling it a"giant meat-eating fish," Deitrich said the Xiphactinus Audax lived in an inland sea with reptiles.

"It's a shame Kansas doesn't have a state fossil," he said Thursday. "Kansas is one of the few states which doesn't have an official fos-

Deitrich was raised in Great Bend Deitrich said the Xiphactinus and has studied fossils since he was 10. A graduate of Wichita State University, he currently is an art student at the University of Kansas.

Deitrich said he named the fossil Jonah in honor of the great fish in the Bible.

"Historians say you have to understand the past to learn about the future," he said.

Highway board has new face

Second-generation Sherman County farmer Bryce Cole has been appointed to the state Highway Advisory Commission by Gov. Kathleen Sebelius. The commission reviews the condition of Kansas highways and recommends plans for improvement to the secretary of transportation. Cole will finish out the fouryear term of Jeff Mason, a Goodland lawyer, who resigned to take another state appointment. Cole said he was approached by a couple of people, including Mason, to apply for the job. He will represent District 3, which stretches from the state line at Sharon Springs to Hays and north to the Nebraska line. The commission meets 12 times a year, Cole said. Mason has served on the commission for nine years. During those years, he said, the commission has been involved in redoing of Cherry Ave. to U.S. 24 and County Road 14 in front of the Northern Sun sunflower plant. "The commission has the ability to veto a particular highway project," Mason said. "It happened only once in his nine years on the commission to a project north of Salina. It looks at projects fairly closely." Mason said he left the commission because he got an appointment to the Judicial Qualifications Commission from the governor. Under state law, a person can only be on one commission, he said. Cole has been farming for 15 years. His wife Jessica and he have three children, Grace, Eve and Henry. In 2005, they opened the Cole Family Farms Corn Maze and Pumpkin Patch, an agritourism business. He is a past president of the Sherman County Historical Society, co-chair of Leadership Sherman County, a member of the Goodland City Planning Commission and a member of the Goodland Rotary Club. "I am excited and am looking forward to representing District 3, which includes Goodland and northwest Kansas," Cole said.
