The Goodland Star-News Nursing home residents can now travel the world, ride a bicycle through the woods, race an 18wheeler, watch favorite television shows from their younger years and watch a slide show of their lives, all from an office chair.

The Sherman County Good Samaritan Center, with help from several donors, spent \$18,000 on a high-powered computer system with software, high-speed Internet access, a steering wheel for race games, a cycle for exercise, a projector and keyboards with large letters so residents can stay mentally and physically active and do some of the things they always wanted.

The center calls it a "residentcentered activity department" program, said Administrator Rick Reeser, and the name of the software is "It's Never 2 Late." People can use the program to take several virtual trips, to the mountains of Colorado, Hawaii or Paris, among others. By moving the mouse, they can have a 360-degree panoramic view of their surroundings, even view the Eiffel Tower from underneath.

Good Samaritan staff can make slide shows of activities, such as the Northwest Kansas District Free Fair and birthday parties, and of the residents' lives, which they can watch either on a monitor or projected onto a big screen.

Residents have touch-screen access to the Internet and e-mail. To access their favorite web sites, they only have to touch a picture of themselves on the screen and then touch a picture of what the site is about. The computer can help them send interactive e-mail.

The center has had the computer a few months, Reeser said, and the staff is still trying to learn all of the residents diversity and exercise. from the Bible, such as the beati-

Dawnelle L. Umberger, 34, pleaded no contest Aug. 21 to a traffic violation in Thomas County District Court.

Umberger's plea has the same effect as a guilty plea to failing to yield the right-of-way to Roger L. Blau and Roberta Casey in an accident Oct. 1, 2005.

The Kansas Highway Patrol reported that Blau and Casey were riding a motorcycle north on Range Avenue at 8:30 p.m. near College Drive.

State troopers said the accident happened when the driver of the Excursion, Umberger, made a left turn into the Colby Bowl and Fun Center in front of the 2003 Yamaha motorcycle,

Umberger was originally charged with two counts of vehicular homicide and one traffic violation. As part of the plea agreement, Thomas County Attorney Andrea Wyrick asked District Magistrate Judge Richard Ress to dismiss the vehicular homicide charges with prejudice, meaning they cannot be filed again.

Colby lawyer Todd Stramel represented Umberger, who was ordered by Ress to pay a fine of \$60 and court costs of \$117 for failure to yield.
