The Goodland Star-News The fireworks that greeted the Goodland football team when they ran onto the field at Cowboys Stadium on Friday must have sparked something, as the boys came from behind to defeat the Hoxie Indians 17-8.

Coach Jonathan Dansel said he wanted to excite the Cowboys fans and get them into the game with his team, which made its first home appearance after losses on the road to Atwood and St. Francis.

The crowd was on their feet and many were out on the field to form parallel lines for the team to run through as the fireworks went off and the players burst through the cheerleaders' hoop. The marching band brought the crowd to their feet again with the presentation of a giant American flag as they played "God Bless the U.S.A."

Announcer Jeff Mason told to the crowd that Carl Friedrichs, home on leave from Iraq, was in the stands.

Once the pregame hoopla was out of the way, the Cowboys took the field. They did not give up a touchdown to the Hoxie offense, but did give one to the defense on a fumble. The Goodland defense stopped one drive at the Cowboys 1 in the second quarter, but Hoxie led 8-0 at the half.

Hoxie got the ball to start the third quarter, but could not move and had to punt to the Cowboys.

"At half time I told them it was still 0-0 and we had given them a touchdown," Dansel said Sunday. "I told the boys they were the better football team out there, and that one sack and we were down by eight.

"We marched the ball up and down the field all night. I told them they had to fight for it, 'you can win if you want it.'

The Cowboys' first touchdown was set up by a 68-yard pass and run by senior tight end Tyler Hillmer to give the team a first and goal at the Indians'4. The touchdown came on a two-yard run by junior fullback T.J. Hawkins with 5:08 left in the third quarter. A two-point conversion run by sophomore Casey Henderson was good to tie the game at 8.
