Atwood native has 10 tackles

Atwood native Jeff Horinek had 10 tackles in Colorado State University's 24-21 road loss last Thursday to the U.S. Air Force Academy.

Horinek, in his second season playing middle linebacker for the Rams, is fifth on the team in tackles through six games. He has 30 so far this season and has one interception, which he returned 14 yards for a touchdown in Colorado State's 28-7 home win over the University of Nevada, Las Vegas on Oct. 7.

Jeff, the son of Bernie and Marilyn Horinek of Atwood, redshirted his first year at Colorado State. He had 61 tackles last season for the Rams, finishing fifth on the team.

A2004 graduate of Atwood High School, Horinek was a first-team All-Northwest Kansas League selection as a running back, linebacker, kicker and punter his senior year. He is studying health and exercise science at Colorado State.

One of Horinek's teammates this season is freshman offensive lineman Mark Starr, a 2006 Goodland High graduate.

The Rams are 4-2 on the season and 1-1 in the Mountain West Conference. The team goes on the road again Saturday to face the University of Wyoming in Laramie. The Cowboys are 3-4 for the season.

Kansas' earliest CSI story Fingerprint ends nationwide '20s manhunt



It is fun to hear from people about their memories of the robbery and what their connection was to the events or the families involved in the story. We were talking to our mother, and she said a woman from Missouri called to ask if she was related to the author of *The Fleagle Gang*. She was telling mom how much she enjoyed reading the book.

A few days later I received a card in the mail from Mildred Cornelius of Thayer, Mo. "Your mother may have told you that I called her to inquire about you. I wanted to tell you how much I enjoyed your book about the Fleagle Gang. My family moved to Lamar the day of the robbery so don't remember much about it. I looked on Google and found your book and bought it. It inspired me to write a journal to pass on to my children about growing up in southeast Colorado. My maiden name

was Keeton and I was four years ahead of your dad in school.

Author Tom (N.T.) Betz, editor of The Goodland Star-News, has spent a lifetime in journalism and on the Great Plains.

"The Fleagle Gang" details the robbery/murder case which hinged on a single fingerprint found on a murdered Dighton, Kan., doctor's car. The fledgling FBI plays a crucial role in turning the fingerprint into solid forensic evidence used to find, arrest and convict members of the Fleagle Gang. The FBI credits the Fleagle case as the first time a single fingerprint was used to identify and convict criminals. The Fleagle Gang robbed banks in Larned, Kinsley, Marysville, Ottawa and McPherson Kan., Lamar, Colo., Eugene, Ore., and countless others of over \$1 million in the 10 years they operated.

"The Fleagle Gang" is available at the Big Timbers Museum in Lamar, Colo., the Holly Library, Holly, Colo.; the Lane County Museum in Dighton, Kan., the Fick Fossil and History Museum in Oakley, Kan., the Finney County Museum and Hastings in Garden City, Kan., the High Plains Museum in Goodland, Kan., the El Quartelejo Museum in Scott City, and the Colorado Prison Museum in Canon City, Colo.
