## Training offered for disaster workers

Following a major disaster, said Judy McKee, Sherman County Neighborhood Watch coordinator, first responders and other government providers might not be able to meet the demands for their services.

Training for a Certified Emergency Response Team will be held Friday-Sunday, Nov. 10-12, at the Sherman County 4-H building. A schedule will be given to applicants after approval for the training.

Applications are available at and can be returned to the Goodland City Administration Building or the Kanorado City Building or call McKee at 890-5188. The deadline said. "Training volunteers is a prito register is Thursday, Nov. 2. At least 10 applicants are needed.

Factors such as the number of victims, communication failures and road blockages will keep people from emergency services they have come to expect at a moment's notice by calling 911, McKee said. People will have to rely on each other.

Experience has shown that in a over 80 percent of successful rescues, she said, but untrained volunteer rescuers may actually cause harm or be injured in the process.

The response team will form a ready force of organized and trained volunteer disaster workers to operate at the neighborhood level, McKee said; when disaster strikes, citizencorps.gov/cert/about.shtm.

Atraining course is being offered volunteers are called into action: for anyone who is interested in they check on neighbors, suppress knowing how to help in case of a small fires, conduct light search and rescue and provide emergency medical aid and comfort to their neighbors.

The program prepares these volunteers with 20 hours of classroom and hands-on training, McKee said. The training is provided by volunteer "subject matter" experts including firefighters, emergency medical technicians and building safety experts, McKee said. "Memories of the 2006 Thanks-


