Changes sought to two-hour parking limit

The Goodland Star-News City commissioners agreed at their last meeting that the two-hour parking limit for trailers, trucks and motor homes in residential areas is too short, but they disagree on how it should be changed.

Members said they want visitors to be able to park in town and stay in a motor home for a few days, and contractors to be able to park a trailer by a job site. They don't want people storing big recreations vehicles, semi-trailer rigs and other equipment stored on the street.

The thorny question will be on the agenda for the commission's next chance to read the current rules. truck or motor home can only be said. "I talked to the (police) chief parked on city streets for two hours a day. That means a motor home cannot be parked overnight or over a weekend without the owner risking a ticket.

The Goodland Star-News The first jobs from the joint city-county road program should begin in the next three weeks with city approval of the low bid from a Halstead company for the replacement of the intersections at Eighth and Caldwell and Armory and Caldwell.

Darin Neufeld, engineer from Evans, Bierly, Hutchison and Associates, who is handling the city projects and a one-mile section of County Road 14,

told the City Commission at the meeting last Monday there were two bids for the Caldwell intersections. Bryant and Bryant Construction of Halstead bid \$322,755 and Miller Construction of Goodland \$345,809. Neufeld said the engineer's estimate had been \$324,800.

Commissioners discussed taking the higher local bid from Miller or rejecting the lower bid because it
