The groom is an engineer at Raytheon, and the bride has her own business.

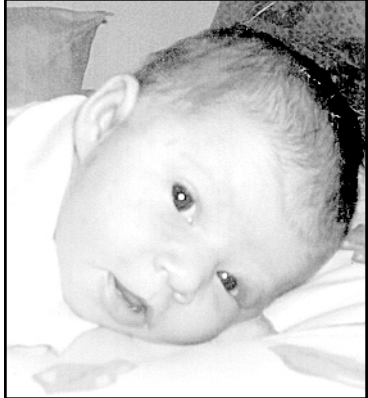
Couple welcomes grandchild

A Goodland student will be on stage this weekend at the Northwest Kansas Cultural Arts Center at Colby Community College.

Corey Grantz, Goodland, is in the cast of "Dearly Departed," the college's fall play, which will be presented at 6:30 p.m. Mountain Time tonight and Saturday. Tickets will be available at the door.

The play is set in the Baptist backwoods of the Bible Belt, where the beleaguered Turpin family proves that living and dying in the South are seldom tidy and always hilari-

ous, said theater department director Terrilyn Fleming.

When the patriarch of the Turpin family keels over dead in the first scene, the struggle to get him buried involves the entire clan, including the not-so-grieving widow, who wants to put "Mean and Surly" on the tombstone.

Despite their earnest efforts to pull themselves together for their father's funeral, the Turpins' other problems keep overshadowing the solemn occasion.

Firstborn Ray-Bud drinks him-

self silly as the funeral bills mount.

Junior, the younger son, is juggling financial ruin, a pack of no-neck monster kids and a wife who suspects him of infidelity in the family car.

Their younger sister, Delightful, copes with death as she does life, by devouring junk food. In addition, all the neighbors add more than their two cents' worth.

As the situation becomes fraught with mishap, Ray-Bud says to his long-suffering wife, "When I die,

don't tell nobody. Just bury me in the back yard and tell everybody I left you."

In the midst of the chaos, the Turpins turn for comfort to their friends and neighbors, an eccentric community of misfits who just manage to pull together and help each other through their hours of need and, finally, the funeral.

A 2001 movie, "Kingdom Come," was based on the play, written by David Bottrell and Jessie Jones.
