It's time to put nitrogen on lawn

November is the time to give cool-season lawns their last nitrogen application of the year.

Why fertilize in November? Because while top growth slows in response to cool temperatures, grass plants are still making food (carbohydrates) by photosynthesis. A November nitrogen application helps boost the photosynthesis rate.

Carbohydrates that are not used in growth are stored in the crown and other storage tissues in the plant. These reserves help the grass green up earlier in the spring and sustain growth into May without the need for earlyspring (March or April) nitrogen.

Those early-spring nitrogen applications are less desirable because they can lead to excessive shoot growth and reduced



root growth. Other benefits of November-applied nitrogen for coolseason grasses include improved winter hardiness, root growth and shoot density.

How much should you apply? One to 1 1/2 pounds actual nitrogen per 1,000 square foot of lawn area is sufficient. In order for this application to be effective, the nitrogen must be readily available to the plant because the growing sea-

son is nearly over. Therefore, for a November application, use a soluble (quickly-avail-

fate. Many turfgrass fertilizers sold in garden centers and other retail outlets contain soluble nitrogen.

Avoid products that contain water-insoluble nitrogen (slowrelease) for this application. As always, sweep up any fertilizer that gets on driveways, sidewalks or streets and reapply it to the lawn.
