The Goodland school system has already completed the first quarter of the academic year with parent/ teacher conferences, and the honor roll for junior high and high school will be in the newspaper.

However, 75 years ago, The Goodland News-Republic printed an article of a much different tone in the "High School News" column. The underachieving students (and their parents) of 1931 received a rather public tongue lashing.

The Flunk List Here Again

The same old story is at hand. The flunk list for the last four weeks shows that at least one-third of the students are failing in some subject. Of those who are failing, perhaps one-third are failing two subjects, and some are failing in three.

It seems that students should take this more seriously and should realize it is a disgrace to themselves as well as to the school body as a whole. The flunk lists in other schools are much less in number. There is no good reason why our school should have more on the dunce list than other schools our size.

Last year when our flunk list came out, immediately following, some showed improvement when it reached the minimum. We naturally expected a similar one with which to start of the new year.

It seems that most of the students immediately concerned pay no attention whatever when the subject is mentioned to them, other than to remark in a complaining voice, it was the same old story to get another bawling out We wonder if they ever realized just who was responsible for the words they do not like to hear. It probably never dawned on them that they could in any way be to blame.

If the parents of these students would realize that they are not getting much of any return on the money they are spending to send their children to school, they might realize too that it might be necessary for those same children to do a little homework and a little less running around at night.

Apparently most of the parents do not care to know whether or not their children are doing satisfactory in school, or they would not let them be out night after night, coming to school with poorly prepared lessons or with no preparation at all.

Many of the students make their boasts that they "certainly don't show this grade card to my folks... I just sign it myself."

That fault lies somewhere outside the school.

Any student who is flunking should take his books home and use

them to study out of school or else take them home and use them for kindling. It is certainly embarrassing to the rest of us to have the school get a reputation for being the headquarters for a bunch of loafers, and from what we can hear, it makes the teacher pretty well disgusted at times.
