

St. Francis Indians in semifinals Friday

The St. Francis Indians fought their way into the semifinals of the Class 2-1A state football playoffs by whipping Ellis 32-14 on Friday. The third-ranked Indians (11-1) will face Smith Center (11-0) in St. Francis at 6 p.m. Mountain Time on Friday. Smith Center defeated LaCrosse 46-0 to make the semifinals. St. Francis was the only area team to advance after action over the weekend. The Sharon Springs Wildcats were knocked out of the unbeaten

ranks and out of the 8-man Division II playoffs on Friday by second-ranked Victoria (11-1), 64-30. Victoria will face Hope at 11 a.m. on Saturday at Newton High School. In Class 3A, Scott City was eliminated by Garden Plain (11-1) 28-14. Garden Plain, of the Central Plains League, will face Hillsboro (9-3) in the semifinals Friday in Hillsboro. In Class 4A, top-ranked Andale (12-0) defeated Rose Hill 49-14 at home Friday.

Andale is ranked fourth among all Kansas high school teams by MaxPreps and ranks first in Class 4A. Fourth-ranked Ulysses (11-1) will face Andale at 6 p.m. Mountain Time in Ulysses on Friday in the semifinals. The Tigers defeated Andover Central 54-7 on Friday to advance. Both teams beat the Goodland Cowboys, Ulysses during the regular season and Andale in the first round of the playoffs.

Former Cowgirl helps Alaska team to a win

Goodland native Jayci Stone scored 14 points Saturday to help the University of Alaska-Anchorage defeat visiting Mid-Continent College of Kentucky 102-53 in the Seawolves' season opener. The teams played even for the first seven minutes until, with the game tied at nine, the Seawolves scored 18 of the next 20 points, taking a 27-11 lead halfway through the first period. Alaska-Anchorage led 46-24 at halftime and outscored the visiting Cougars 56-29 in the second pe-

riod. Stone, a senior forward, was one of five Seawolves to score in double figures. The Seawolves outrebounded their opponents 51-26, and Stone was second on the team, grabbing seven rebounds. Mid-Continent junior guard Sarah Cripps led all scorers with 23 points. It was the second straight loss for the Cougars, who lost to the University of Alaska Fairbanks on Friday 105-66, leaving Mid-Continent 3-2 for the season.

The Cougars and the Seawolves were to have played again Monday night. Next week, Alaska-Anchorage will be the host team for the Carrs/Safeway Great Alaska Shootout. The Seawolves will face the U.S. Air Force Academy from Colorado Springs next Tuesday, then will play either Butler University of Indiana or the University of California, Riverside on Wednesday. Alaska-Anchorage, an NCAA Division II school, is a member of the nine-team Great Northwest Athletic Conference. The Seawolves, who finished 13-14 last season, were picked fifth in the conference coaches' preseason poll earlier this month.

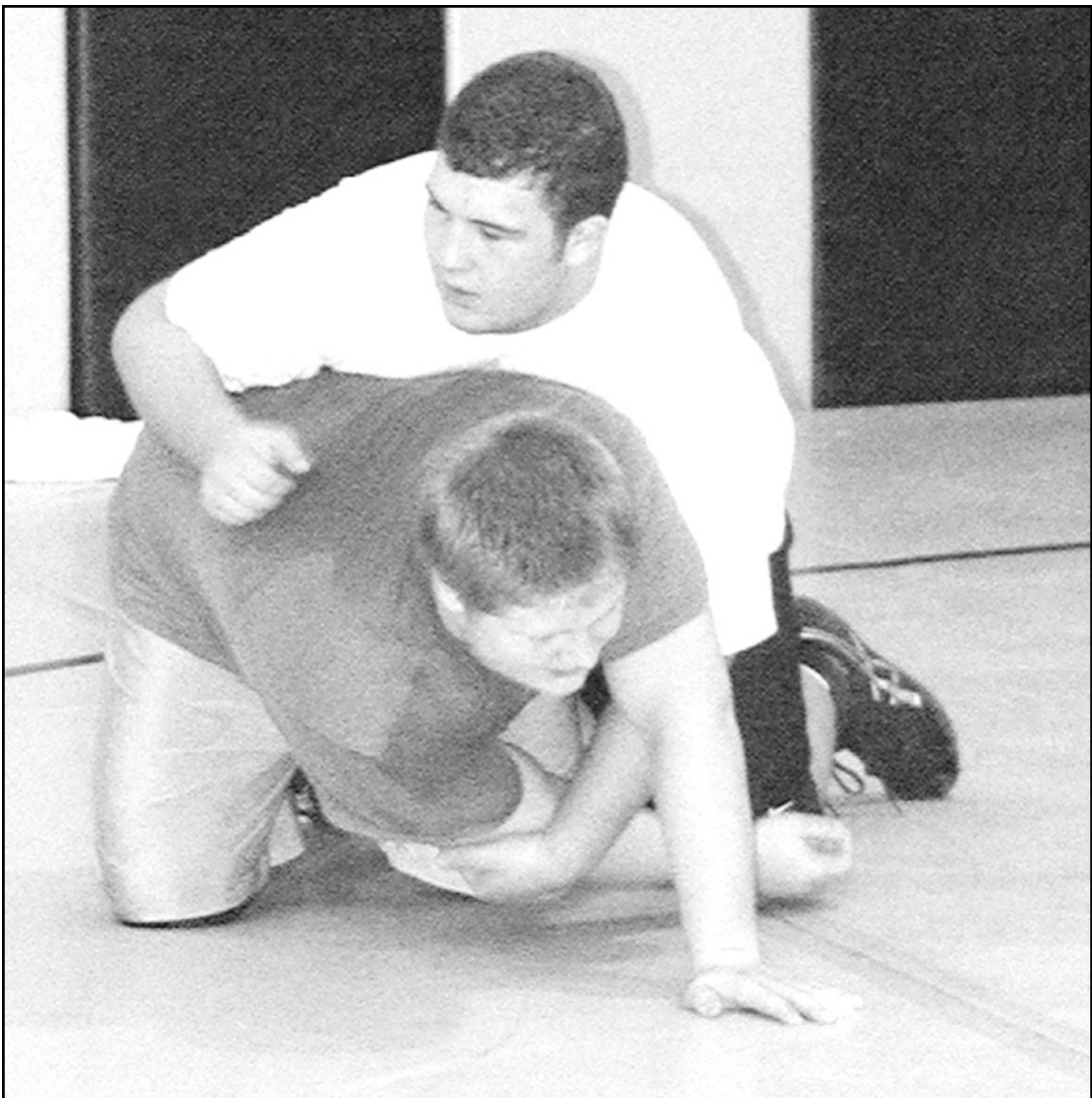

Four Kansas teams among top 25

Four football teams from the Kansas Collegiate Athletic Conference were among the top 25 in the final regular season poll by the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics, with two making the national playoffs. Friends University defeated Sterling College 20-7 Saturday to finish the regular season 9-1. The Falcons, ranked No. 10, will be on the other side of the Mississippi River next Saturday to face No. 8 Bethel College of McKenzie, Tenn. The Wildcats, members of the Mid-South Conference, enter the playoffs 9-2.

Bethel College of North Newton also finished the regular season 9-1 after defeating Ottawa University 42-21. The Threshers, ranked 15th, will visit Missouri Valley College in Marshall. The Vikings, ranked No. 5, are 11-0 and are one of four undefeated teams heading to the playoffs. The Coyotes of Kansas Wesleyan University won their first seven games but then lost two straight before defeating Bethany College 31-16 Saturday to end their season 8-2. Wesleyan ranked No. 20 in Sunday's poll, but didn't make the playoffs.

Although they lost Saturday to Friends, the Warriors of Sterling still made the final poll at No. 25 with a 7-3 record. Two other Kansas teams made the top 25. Benedictine College of Atchison and MidAmerica Nazarene University of Olathe, both members of the Heart of America Athletic Conference, ranked No. 19 and 22 respectively. The quarterfinals will be played Saturday, Nov. 25, and the semifinals on Dec. 2. The championship game, the "Rumble on the River," will be played Saturday, Dec. 16 at Jim Carroll Stadium in Savannah, Tenn.
