Search continues for missing 81-year-old

The search continues this week morning, called in the Plainville for an 81-year-old Rawlins County man who's been missing from his rural home for most of the month.

No trace has turned up since the man's pickup was found a couple of days later at the federal reservoir west of Norton.

Morris Dale Nelson was reported missing about 8:30 p.m. Nov. 7 to the Rawlins County Sheriff's office. He was last seen that afternoon in the southern part of Rawlins County, driving his white 1979 Chevy pickup.

A search by Rawlins County Sheriff's Department, family, friends and neighbors turned up nothing, Sheriff Bill Finley said. The Kansas Highway Patrol joined the ground and air search the next
