Dear Attorney General Kline: I'm starting my holiday shopping soon. Could you please provide me with some tips on becoming a smarter shopper and not becoming a scam victim?

Dear Kansas Consumer:

During this especially hectic time of the year, you need to make welleducated decisions, whether you're trying to get the most for your money or you just want to avoid falling victim to con artists. To help you reduce the chance of being scammed during the holidays, here are some suggestions you should consider:

• Do not pre-print your driver's phone numbers on your checks.

• If you buy used items, be aware that many safeguards such as the Kansas Consumer Protection Act and recourse to the Better Business Bureau do not exist when buying
