in Junior Olympic meet Snow had to be plowed from the cross country course in Spokane, Wash., for the U.S. Track and Field Association National Junior Olym-

pic meet Saturday, but a Goodland runner was pleased with his race anyway. Kerek Mason had been seeded

114 among the 135 runners who showed up for the race, said his father, Jeff Mason. Originally, 185 runners were registered from 48 of the 50 states.

"Having had a tough race at the Kansas state championships and running an 18:30 to qualify at Rim Rock, Kerek was looking to place better than his seed and run faster than his qualifying time," his father said. "Kerek accomplished both goals by placing 94, 20 ahead of where he had been seeded, and running the 5 kilometer (3.1 mile) course in 18:10.66 after slipping and falling in the first three-quarters of a mile. The winning time was posted by a Spokane Track Club member at 15:39.57. The last runner posted a 23:39, Mason reported. A total of 2,500 athletes participated in five age groups and in boys and girls divisions. Opening ceremonies were Friday at the Spokane Convention Center. Runners from each region paraded in, with one athlete carrying the placard. The athletes were welcomed by the mayors of Spokane and Spokane Valley before they took the Olympic Oath. The 10-and-under age group kicked off the races at 10 a.m. Saturday at Plantes Ferry Park in Spokane Valley. "The first few races were run under partly cloudy conditions," Mason said. "However, conditions deteriorated through the afternoon. By the time the young men's division — where Kerek ran — was run at 2:30 p.m., it was 29 degrees and raining. The course was in pretty
