The Goodland Star-News Warmer temperatures and sunshine helped clear the roads of western Kansas and eastern Colorado this week, but Mother Nature had a second punch ready for New Year's weekend travelers.

The National Weather Service in Goodland expects a major winter storm to come from the west, starting with rain Thursday evening and turning to snow overnight. The Goodland office issued a winter storm warning from 5 a.m. today through 5 a.m. on Sunday.

"The strong storm system will move east of the Rockies on Friday and onto the central plains by Sunday," the weather service winter storm warning said. "A wintry mix of precipitation will continue across the region before turning to all snow by early Saturday morning. Heavy snow accumulations of well over a foot are possible along with areas of freezing precipitation."

Snow is expected to continue through Saturday with areas of blowing snow driven by north to northwest winds of 15 to 20 mph, and increasing to 25 to 30 mph. Winds with gusts to 45 mph will develop across far eastern Colorado and western Kansas this afternoon and continue through Sunday morning.

Snow accumulations through Sunday are expected to be from 10 to 15 inches, with the heaviest expected west of a line from McCook, Neb., to Gove.

Today's high should be near 29 with a low around 20. Saturday, the high is expected to be 27, and a low of 14. Areas of blowing snow and a 70 percent chance of snow during the day and continue through the night. New snow accumulation of 5 to 9 inches possible.

Sunday, the high should be near 33 with a 30 per-

Moran applauds decision

The Goodland Star-News Congressman Jerry Moran said Thursday he's pleased to see the Department of Veterans Affairs plans to open a veterans outreach clinic in the Goodland area - and hopes it will be in Kansas.

Three High Plains communities are in the running for a clinic that will be opened next year to serve a nine-county area, the department's Rocky Mountain Region said last Monday: Yuma and Burlington in Colorado or Goodland.

Moran was on the road in northcentral Kansas, making stops on his listening tour, headed to Glasco, which is south of Concordia.

In a phone interview, he said he was glad to hear about the clinic announcement when he came back from a trip to Cuba. He said it was good to see the veterans calling the Rocky Mountain Regional office to say they want the clinic to be in Goodland. He agreed it might not be a deciding factor, but saying it is a "squeaky-wheel-gets-the-grease" process.

"I am trying to be a squeaky wheel," Moran said. "I talked to Dr. Lawrence Biro, Veterans Affairs director in Denver, and have pushed for an outreach clinic in Goodland
