Former Goodland man in jail for fighting neighbor over wife

Sherman County Historical Society April 2, 1903: Former Goodland Man Gets Into Trouble With a Neighbor — George DeBord, the eccentric old soldier who used to live in Goodland several years ago, is in jail in Lincoln, Neb.

DeBord was a widower while he lived here, but upon removing to Lincoln, he married a young woman.

And this is the reason why both DeBord and Darling, who is a masculine admirer of Mrs. DeBord, are both in jail. A Lincoln paper gives the following account of the affair:

George W. DeBord, an old man who works on the streets for a livelihood for himself and his family, has a distressing case of young wife on the hand, which is responsible for his present confinement in the city jail.

DeBord is 65 years old, and his wife but 30. She is the mother of two children. DeBord is charged with having threatened the life of Robert Darling, a young man who has
