Flushots are still available

With the delay in the influenza vaccine this year, we have seen a decrease in the number of people being vaccinated against the flu. I want to encourage anyone who routinely gets a flu shot, and hasn't done so, to get one. It is not too late and there is vaccine available.

Influenza, or flu, is a viral infection of the respiratory system: nose, throat and lungs. This is often confused with symptoms associated with the stomach and intestine including nausea, vomiting and diarrhea. There are two types of influenza virus - A and B. Each type includes many different strains which tend to change

Influenza occurs most often in the winter months. People are at greatest risk of getting the flu from mid-December through March. Illness resembling influenza may occur in the summer months, but it is usually due to other viruses. Anyone can get the flu, but it is most serious in the elderly, people with chronic illnesses such as cancer, emphysema, diabetes or weak immune systems.

The flu is highly contagious and is easily transmitted through contact with droplets from the nose and throat of an infected person during coughing and sneezing. Symptoms include: headache, high fever, chills, cough and body aches. Intestinal symptoms

Because of our sins, we have rejected God's right to create a good and glorious creation, by breaking faith with God and introducing the discordant note of sin in the midst of God's good earth.
