How to slow down and not be late

Wednesday, January 17, 2001

Getting yourself ready to go somewhere and arriving on time is a relatively simple act — unless, you have young children. Then the logistics change drastically. Each child means one more pair of shoes to locate, one additional stop in the bathroom and one more person to get out the door.

What makes it harder is that young children haven't yet developed a sense of time. They truly can't understand your sense of urgency when you're trying to hurry them out of the house in the morning.

What helps is for you to think backwards, according to the "Well-Centered Child", January 2001, publication. Start with the door you leave by and travel home in your mind. How long does the trip take? Add 10 minutes for unexpected problems. Now you have your absolute, last-minute, leave-the-house time. Then picture yourself and your kids

heading out the front door. What's in each person's hands? Keys? Diaper bag? Lunches? School bags? Line it all up at the door the night before.

What's everyone wearing? Coats? Mittens? Hats? Scarves? Boots? Line them up, too.

Pack diaper bags, school papers, and lunches the night before. Have everyone, including yourself, choose and lay out their clothes then, too.
