Blood donations vital to millions

About 12.6 million units of blood are donated in the United States every year by approximately 8 million volunteer blood donors. These units are transfused to about 4 million patients per year.

Less than 5% of healthy Americans eligible to donate blood actually donate. According to studies, the average donor is a college-educated white male, between the ages of 30 and 50, who is married and has an above-average income. However, a broad cross-section of the population donates every day. Furthermore, these "average" statistics are changing, and women and minority groups are volunteering to donate in increasing numbers.

To be eligible to donate, a person must generally be at least 17 years of age (some states permit younger people to donate with parental consent); be in good health; and weigh at least 110 pounds. Most blood banks have no upper age limit. All donors must pass the physical and health history examinations given prior to donation.

Next comes the detailed history., which is designed to ask questions that protect the health of both donor and recipient, and also questions about transfusion-transmissible diseases and whether donating blood might endanger their health. If they respond positively, they will be asked not to donate blood. Health history is also used to identify donors who have been exposed to, or who may have diseases such as, HIV, hepatitis or malaria.

servation area for light refreshments and a brief rest period. Blood can be donated once every 8 weeks. Patients scheduled for surgery may be eligible to donate blood for themselves, a process known as autologous blood donation. In the weeks before non-emergency surgery, an autologous donor may be able to donate blood that will be stored until the surgical procedure. In an emergency, anyone can receive type O red blood cells. Therefore, those with type O blood are known as "universal donors" and are encouraged to donate.
