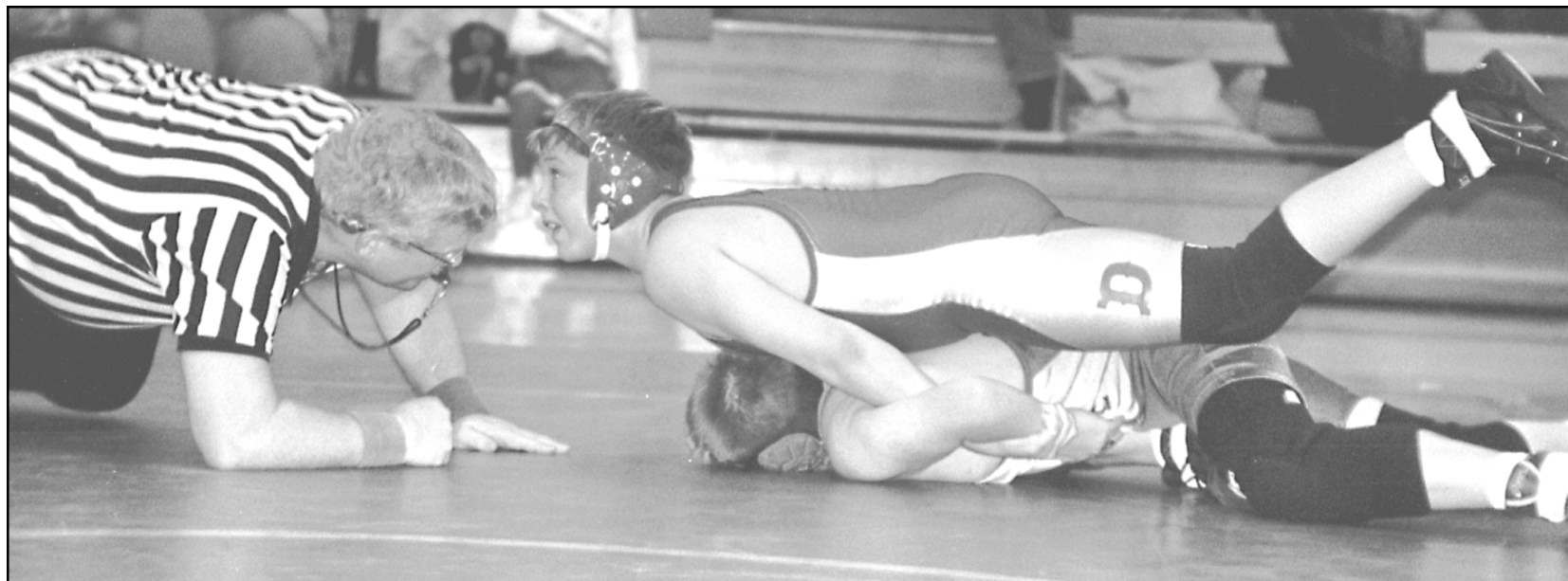

Beavers go into overtime twice

The Herndon High boys basketball team beat Jennings/Lenora 77-74 but fell to Logan 50-49 both in overtime at the Cheyenne Conference Tournament in Phillipsburg two weeks ago.

Last Tuesday, the Beavers lost to Weskan 82-54 on the road and on Friday they played a tough home game against Eastern Height (Agra) and fell 76-29.

Herndon won a squeaker over Jennings/Lenora in the first game of the tournament

The Beavers led 16-15 at the end of the first quarter and were behind 36-35 at the end of the half. The Coyote/Wildcats edged ahead in the third quarter and led 57-50 but the Beavers caught up and tied the score at 69 all at the final buzzer.

In overtime, Isaac Marintzer was able to hit a pair of three pointers (two of the four he hit against the Coyotes) and Josh Allen and Lance Basgall each put in a free throw. The

Coyotes were only able to answer with 5 points.

Scoring for the Beavers were Marintzer and David Sattler, 20 points each; Mark Solko, 13; Allen, 12 including three three-point shots; Abe Marintzer, 8; and Basgall, 4.

In the final game of the tourney, the tables were turned as Logan won in overtime on a free throw.

The game started out slow for the Beavers as Logan took a first quarter lead of 10-6. Herndon came back, however, and tied the score at the half at 21 all. The Trojans edged ahead again in the third quarter to lead 33-30. At the end of the fourth quarter, Herndon had again come back to tie the score at 44.

In overtime, both teams hit a regular field goal and a three pointer. Logan, however, also put in one of six charity shots. Herndon had no opportunity for free throws in overtime and lost the game because of fouls.

Scoring for Herndon were Sattler, 20 including a three pointer; Allen, 10 including two three pointers; I. Marintzer, 8 including a three pointer; Adam Ketterl, 6; Basgall, 2; and A. Marintzer, Solko and Nik Martin, 1 each.

Last Tuesday, the Beavers couldn't get it together as they met the Weskan Coyotes and fell 82-54.

Weskan started off tough, outscoring the Beavers 19-8 in the first quarter and 29-12 in the second to lead 48-20 at the end of the half. In the third quarter, Herndon matched the Coyotes 16-16 to trail 64-36 and in the fourth quarter outscored the Coyotes 18-16, but it wasn't nearly enough.

Scoring for the Beavers were Allen and I. Marintzer 14 each; Ketterl, 7; Basgall, 5; Curtis Brown, 4; A. Marintzer, 3; Sattler, Solko and Martin, 2 each; and Zach Williams, 1.

I. Marintzer and Basgall each hit a three-pointer and Allen hit a pair. Dan Riener also was in the games against both Logan and Weskan

Friday's game was even worse for the Beavers, as the Mustangs from Eastern Heights hit hard and fast.

The Mustangs started out the a 3-1 lead in the first quarter, outscoring the Beavers 15-5. By the half, they had increased their lead to 33-14, scoring 18 to Herndon's 9. By the end of the third quarter the tally stood at 57-19 as Eastern Heights added 24 and Herndon 5. Only in the fourth quarter could the Beavers score in double figures — 10.

Scoring for Herndon were I Marintzer, 10 including a three-point shot; Basgall, 7, including a three pointer; Sattler, 5; Ketterl, 3; and Solko and Martin, 2 each.

The next game will be at Winona against TriPlains on Tuesday.

Girls win one, lose two

The Jennings/Lenora girls beat Palco but fell to Herndon and Kensington in the Cheyenne Conference Tournament two weeks ago in Phillipsburg.

In the first game of the tournament, the Coyote/Wildcats lost to the Herndon Beavers 53-44.

"The girls went down scratching and clawing," Coach Becky Ayers said. "Despite the 53-44 loss, the girls had an outstanding second half. They had very few turnovers, made 14 field goals versus Herndon's eight and there were several defensive stops.

"Unfortunately, the deficit was just too much to overcome. If we could have knocked down our free throws and played better defense in the first half, the game could have been a different story.

"We came out very timid and sluggish on defense in the first half. We have got to become more consistent in order to be successful. I was very pleased with the girls' efforts in the second half and I am anxious for our next match up against Herndon."

"Herndon was an outstanding free-throw shooting team and attacked the bucket well."

Herndon hit 20 of 34 free-throw attempts while Jennings was only able to sink four of 14 tries.

Jennings started the game off with a 7-13 deficit in the first quarter. This increased to 25-12 by the end of the half. In the third quarter, Herndon again outscored the Coyotes 16-13 to lead 41-25. In the last quarter the Coyotes got hot, hitting 19 points to Herndon's 12, but it was too late.

Scoring were Nickie Rhodes, 12 points; Lori Vahling, 10; Ann Carter, 7; Diane Becker, 6; Sarah Meitl, 5; and Whitney DuBois, 4.

Carter and Rhodes each hit a three-point shot.

Becker was the top rebounder with seven followed by Carter and Meitl, six each; Rhodes and Vahling, five each; DuBois and Peggy Foster, two each; and Kristi Smith, one.

In the second round, Jennings beat Palco 45-42.

It was a seesaw match with Palco ahead 14-13 at the end of the first quarter. Jennings ahead 26-21 at the end of the half and ahead 38-35 at the end of the third quarter.

Scoring for the Coyote/Wildcats were Rhodes, 22; Carter, 10; Vahling, 6; Becker and DuBois, 3 each; and Meitl 1.

Rhodes was the leading rebounder with 10 followed by Carter, eight; DuBois and Meitl, seven each; Vahling, four; and Becker, three.

Kensington edged the Coyote/Wildcats 35-30 in the last game of the tournament.

Again the game was close throughout, although Kensington was ahead at the end of every quarter, 8-7, 16-14, 20-18 and 35-30.

Jennings led Kensington in rebounds, 31-28, and steals 14-13.

Scoring against Kensington were Vahling, 12; Rhodes, 11; Meitl, 3; and DuBois and Carter, 2 each.

Vahling led in rebounding with 13 followed by Meitl, six; Rhodes and Becker, four each; and Carter and DuBois, two each.

The girls will be in Logan on Friday.
