Magic-lantern show to feature valentines

The American Magic-Lantern Theater will present "A Victorian Valentine Show" at 2 p.m. on Sunday, Feb. 11, at The Gateway. It is sponsored by the Oberlin Arts and Humanities Commission.

This is the only professional group performing magic-lantern shows in America, and is one of only three in the world. It is dedicated to helping modern audiences understand and enjoy Victorian literature and art by recreating the lost theatrical tradition of magic-lantern productions.

Over the last 10 years, theater mem-

bers have appeared in hundreds of performances all over this country and in Europe. Terry Borton, a fourth-generation lantern, narrates the performance, which he also wrote and produced. The theater company will take the audience back 100 years, before modern technology brought viewers VCRs, big screen televisions, cinema complexes and camcorders.

Bloodmobile will be at American Legion today

The Red Cross Bloodmobile will be at the Oberlin American Legion Hall from 11 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. today.

The bloodmobile comes to Oberlin about every six months, said Hospital Administrator Lynn Doeden. Until about 4 p.m., those who haven't made appointments can walk in to donate blood.

The agency accepts all blood types and isn't short a specific type as far as she knows. The bloodmobile is operated through the American Red Cross, which supplies blood for the Decatur

County Hospital when needed.

There are some restrictions on donors: they must be 17 years or older and weigh at least 110 pounds. Also, they ask those who have a cold to not donate. They must be off antibiotics for two days, can't have had a blood transfusion or body piercing or tattoo in the last 12 months, or had surgery in the last six weeks.

Mrs. Doeden said that donating blood is a good idea because some day those who give might be the ones who need it.

Korean conference set in Abilene

The Eisenhower Foundation and the Dwight D. Eisenhower Library will host a Korean War Teachers Conference from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Friday, Feb. 9, bringing together nationally recognized Korean War experts, outstanding Korean War teaching resources, and K-12 teachers.

The conference, entitled "The Korean War +50: No Longer Forgotten," will feature a panel of war veterans who will share their personal experiences of the Korean War a half century after the conflict. It will take place in the Official Eisenhower Center in Abilene.

Presenters will share their knowledge, teaching ideas and personal stories with the educators. The importance of using music, poetry, movies, the

popular press and primary sources as creative ways to supplement textbook accounts will be discussed.

Luncheon speaker will be Paul Shin, State Senator from Washington, who will share his story as an orphan of the Korean War.

Teachers who attend the conference have the option of earning graduate credit in history through Kansas State University's College of Arts and Sciences. The conference is funded by the Eisenhower Foundation and the Dwight D. Eisenhower Library.
