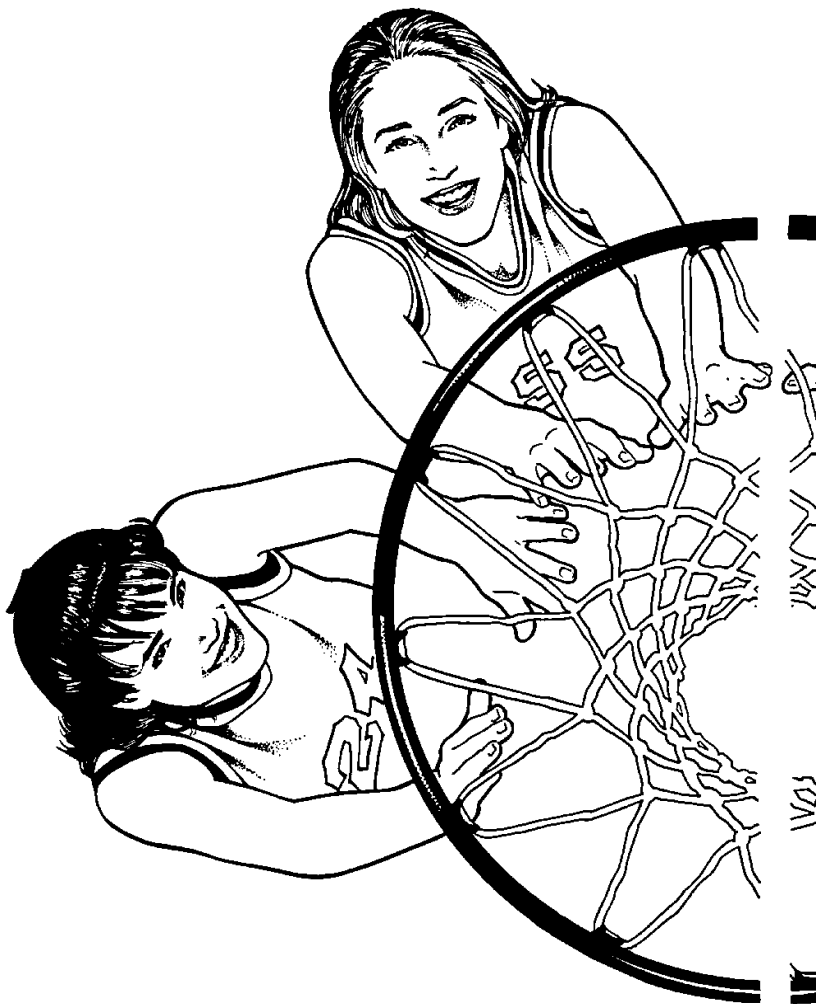

Oberlin girls fall to Atwood team in sub-state game

The Decatur Community High girls team fell in the first game of sub-state basketball play at Atwood 69-57.

“Our girls played well enough to win,” Coach Paul Nepodal said. “It was a shame we had to come up short. Their overall experience and our lack of free throws were the keys to the game. This definitely gives us something positive to build on for next season.”

While Atwood took the lead in the first quarter 17-11 and led 36-32 at the end of the half, in the third quarter the Devil girls came on strong, outscoring the Buffaloes 15-12 to cut their lead to 48-47.

However, the Buffaloes went to the free throw line 18 times in the last quarter and sank 11 of them. The

Devils took three charity shots without sinking any and Atwood led the quarter 21-10.

Scoring for Oberlin were Dani Dorshorst, 18; Abby Ream, 14, Jennifer Thomas, 11; Kortney Stapp, 8; Haley Vollertsen, 4; and Kelsey Dorshorst, 2.

D. Dorshorst was the leading rebounder with 12 followed by Vollertsen with nine and K. Dorshorst with six.

While the Lady Devils had a disappointing season, winning only two games, they will lose no players to graduation because there were no seniors on the team.

Leah Marietta, Dana Sattler, Kerrie Olson, Sarah Ruf, Rena Unger and Lindsay Fortin also played during the season.



Student places sixth in track competition

Nick Wolfram, a 2000 graduate of Decatur Community High School, competed for the University of Detroit Mercy in the Midwestern Collegiate Conference 2001 Indoor Track and Field Championships at the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor.

The Midwestern Conference is a National Col-

legiate Athletic Association Division I conference comprising Butler, Cleveland State, Illinois at Chicago; Loyola, Wisconsin, Green Bay, Wisconsin, Milwaukee, Wright State, and Detroit Mercy universities.

Wolfram competed in the long jump, triple jump, and the 60-meter high hurdles.

He placed sixth in the triple jump with a jump of 40 feet, 8 inches, and sixth in the high

hurdles with a time of 9.56.

He did not make the long jump finals. This was his first indoor championship competition.

The outdoor season begins on March 30 in Richmond, Va.

His parents, LaMoine and Ruth Wolfram, of Oberlin, attended the meet, then spent the weekend with him in Detroit.

Oberlin graduate suits up at K-State

Chris Post, a 1998 graduate of Decatur Community High School, fulfilled a dream last September when he ran out onto the field wearing a Powercat on the side of his helmet in the Kansas State-Louisiana Tech football game.

“It was the biggest adrenaline rush that I had ever experienced,” he said, “coming out of the locker room with the music blaring and hearing 50,000 screaming fans.”

“The Nebraska game was a moment I will never forget. During the final minute, the scene was almost like it was straight out of a movie. The air was perfectly calm, and the snow was fall-

ing quite heavily.

“We were on defense, and we had to stop them one more time to secure the game. Dyshod Carter broke up the pass, and the stadium erupted. Fans rushed the field, and on the way back to the locker room, everyone around was hugging the players and each other. It was a moment that will be etched in my mind forever.”

Post, 6 foot, 2 inches tall and 220 pounds, played two seasons for the Garden City Broncbusters and was an Academic All-American there. Last season, he was a walk-on redshirt (No. 37) for the K-State Wildcats, where he played strong safety.

“Playing football here takes up a lot of time,” he said, “especially during the season, when it’s 40-plus hours, but I think that it is rewarding to be a part of a nationally recognized program.”

He said that the Wildcats’ game at the Cotton Bowl in Dallas was against Tennessee and the boys enjoyed doing a lot of “neat things” down there. They visited a Children’s Hospital, went to a Mavericks game and attended a banquet. He said they had a good following with the fans in Dallas.

Post is majoring in business administration of information systems and is carrying a 3.65 grade point average. He was on the Big 12 Honor Roll for the fall semester.

His parents are Greg and Myrna Post, who now live at Hugoton.
