Board reviews teachers

In three, one-hour closed sessions. the Oberlin School Board heard staff evaluations from the principals of the high school and grade school Monday

Superintendent Duane Steele said every year at this time the board hears reviews for about one-third of the staff, or 25 to 30 teachers. Principals Duane Dorshorst and Gordon Matson sit in on classes, he said. They record what happens to look at the effectiveness of their teaching style and see if something needs to change. The principals then go over what they find with the teachers and present it to the board.

New teachers are reviewed every year and tenured teachers every three years. Tenured teachers' reviews may talk about things they needed to work on from a previous review or how their style has changed, said Superintendent

At the board meeting Monday, the principals will present rehiring recommendations to the members, said Superintendent Steele.
