

Mr. Robinson said the first task was to build the web site. The students pretty much used the one from last year, he said, but changed some things on it. Video equipment has to be set up, press releases written and sent out and each of the schools coming to the tournament received a letter so they would know about the site and give permission for their team to be on the Internet. The students are still waiting on one form

to be returned. Mrs. Dejmal said Jake has made all of the contacts and written the press release. He has learned a lot about business, she said.
