(Continued from Page 1) she said. "We spent most of the time taking walks or going to the movies, which cost 10 cents. However, during the 'Roaring 20s' there was good music and young people enjoyed dancing.

"No one had any money in those days, so we were all in the same boat. If I had a nickel, I thought I was rich."

After they were married on Jan. 17, 1924, the couple moved many times over the years. Her husband was a high school business teacher, then later became a school superintendent. He served in Madison, Haven, Nickerson and Mulvane. The W.D. Munson Elementary School at Mulvane was named after her husband, who died in 1972.

During World War II, she said, he was in charge of an adult education

program at the Boeing plant in Wichita.

Mrs. Munson taught all eight grades in a rural school for one year, and said she has the utmost respect for good teachers. Her biggest concern is that they are underpaid.

"Teachers spend more time with their students during the day than their parents do," she said, "and if they are good teachers, they are sought after and deserve to be paid as well as other professionals. It is a hard job, too, since most are not allowed to properly discipline their students.

"When parents send their children to their room for disciplinary reasons these days, it surely is not too much punishment, since most have television, Nintendos and other entertainment in their rooms."

## Oberlin woman's photo chosen for Forever Kansas

A color photograph titled "Windmill and Flowers" by Kay Chambers of Oberlin was selected to be included in "Forever Kansas," a hardbound book which includes photographs featured in *Kansas!* magazine.

Taken near Oberlin, the photograph is among 160 which have been compiled in the large 10 1/2 x 11 1/2 inch book. The book also celebrates the life of former *Kansas!* magazine editor Andrea Glen, who over many years drew readers of *Kansas!* magazine deeply into the backroads and byways of this state. Her words accompany more than 130 beautiful color photographs of the state's surroundings.

The photographs were selected from more than 1,000 pictures taken by the finest photographers in the

state. Royalties from each book sold go to a scholarship fund for Kansas students established in Andrea's name. She died in 2001 after a three-month illness.

Ms. Glenn was a graduate of Kansas State University with a journalism degree and worked in advertising until accepting the position at age 26 as editor of *Kansas!* magazine in 1978. This was the beginning of a distinguished career promoting the wonders and uniqueness of Kansas.

As one of the winning photographers, Ms. Chambers was invited to a forum with Bill Kurtis, who wrote the introduction for the book, in the Little Theater at Johnson County Junior College in Overland Park, and also a party at the Douglas County Bank in Lawrence.

Mr. Randel said he is responsible for making sure everything works. He said he gets the server up and going and the Internet connection working.

Mr. Robinson said the first task was to build the web site. The students pretty much used the one from last year, he said, but changed some things on it. Video equipment has to be set up, press releases written and sent out and each of the schools coming to the tournament received a letter so they would know about the site and give permission for their team to be on the Internet. The students are still waiting on one form to be returned.

Mrs. Dejmaj said Jake has made all of the contacts and written the press release. He has learned a lot about business, she said.

Last Wednesday, students were out selling banner ads for the page. Jess Elwood and Natasha Weishapl helped with selling the ads.

During the big day, all of the students will work a shift. Some work the cameras, others radio back to inform those updating in the library what is happening and others make sure things are going smoothly on the site.

Mr. Robinson said other than some last-minute ads to sell, everything is pretty much ready after the equipment is set up.

During the project, he said, he learned a lot of communication skills.

He also has learned about video on the Internet, using the computer and working under pressure.

Mr. Robinson plans to graduate in May and is looking at studying computer engineering or computer science at the University of Kansas.
