Find out about water quality

What does Total Maximum Daily Loads (TMDL) refer to? That is the question that many of you probably have when reading information on surface water quality is-

Total Maximum Daily Loads is a list of objectives and strategies needed to achieve water quality standards. These standards are established to clean up the surface water in lakes, streams, wetlands and elsewhere, so that it is safe to use in different ways. The Kansas Department of Health and Environment sets standards for each watershed. Of the counties I cover, every one

except Decatur has a high-priority watershed, where these goals are supposed to be implemented by July 1. Most watersheds in this area likely will have them eventually.
