Herndon votes for true consolidation

The Herndon School Board voted to consolidate with the Atwood School District at their special town hall meeting last Wednesday night.

Before the meeting started the Herndon board held a meeting in which they had decided to not consolidate, but after answering questions and taking a straw poll from the large crowd at the meeting they changed their minds.

Herndon Board Member David Ketterl said the board opened the dialogue between Herndon, Oberlin, Atwood and Golden Plains to research, which led to consolidation. Consolidation is not the way the board wanted to go, he said.

No school district has said they will keep the school in Herndon open for longer than a year and if the board uses the money wisely the school can stay open.

The board does not feel that consolidation is necessary, said Mr. Ketterl. He said the board is working with people in the city on how to market the community and once people who were in the audience. the school is gone it can never be
