

Farm yield policy changed

Some farmers enrolling in the ing the base period 1998 through government's Direct and Countercyclical Program may be able to use past records of loan deficiency payments or neighbors' production to establish yields.

Diane Barrett, county executive director of the U.S. Farm Service Agency, says the new policy allows the agency's County Committee to use Loan Deficiency Payment records, if available, or assign a yield for crops base on three similar

She said that this new rule only applies to producers who did not have an interest in a given farm dur-vice office at (785) 475-3131.

2001. For example, if a farm was purchased in 2000, the new owner may not be able to obtain yield history for the farm in 1998 and 1999.

She said the yield policy change is available to all affected farmers, even if they have already enrolled in or received these payments. Producers who have already enrolled must file a request on or before April 1 to have the county committee use Loan Deficiency Payment records or assign a yield instead of using the 75 percent yield plug.
