

With Kansas ranking in the top five states in the country for the number of methamphetamine labs seized, do you know how to spot a meth lab in your neighborhood? Chances are high that a meth lab

could be right next door. Meth labs have been found in user's home, rental properties, apartments, mobile homes, hotel/motel rooms, vehicles, vacant buildings and storage units. Labs have been seized in farm fields, wooded areas, trailers, outbuildings, barns and garages. The materials needed to produce

meth will fit inside a small suitcase and are often stored or transported that way. Indicators for spotting meth labs include unusual and strong odors, an unusual number of


Staying involved with that which has the potential for good is a must. Potential good is in every person. It got there by design. When God finished the beginning stage of creation, "God saw every-
