# Slaying suspect caught

#### Norton man held for homicide

A 20-year-old Norton man was being held in the beating death Saturday of his stepfather.

Norton police officers, county sheriff's deputies and Kansas Bureau of Investigation agents worked around the clock to gather evidence against the man, who was being detained in Norton County Jail.

Jimmy D. Williams was arrested in the slaying of his stepfather, Billy H. Masden, 53, after an emergency medical call took officers to Mr. Masden's home at 111 S. Archer at 7:25 a.m. Saturday.

The ambulance crew found Mr. Masden, who had "traumatic" injuries. An autopsy was ordered by Deputy County Coroner Ruben

A press release issued by County Attorney Doug Sebelius did not say when Mr. Williams was taken into custody, or how long the body had been at the home after the attack.

Assistant County Attorney Karen Griffiths said Mr. Williams is being detained on probable cause. Officials have to get criminal charges filed against him, at least within 96 hours, she said. If Mr. Williams was taken into custody Saturday morning, that would mean that officials have until Wednesday.

Once the charges have been filed, Mr. Williams will have a first appearance, then an arraignment, a preliminary hearing and then, if the evidence is strong enough, a trial.

Mrs. Griffiths said she has been working in Norton for 19 years and has never seen or worked a homicide

Mr. Sebelius was out of the office Monday, but she said she didn't think he had ever worked a homicide case in Norton either. He will be prosecuting the case.

# **Budget** talksstart forcounty

Members of the Decatur County Extension Council and the area extension director met with the Decatur County commissioners last Tuesday about the budget for the extension service for the next year.

The county helps pay for the service, with the rest of the money to fund the service coming from state. The state gives \$16,250 per agent for the county. For the multi-county agents the state pays entirely for

For this year, the service requested \$73,072 from the county. Commissioners agreed to pay only

The service is asking for \$71,072 for the 2004 budget, including the slightest increase in salaries and wages, said Area Director Reba The commissioners have 10 days

to approve the request or send it back to the extension council. The commissioners didn't make a decision, saying they will not

know what the county valuation is or what the county budget will be until July 1. Until the tax valuations are known, the commissioners said, they will not know how much a given levy will raise.

The commissioners agreed to continue the extension budget as it stands, and if a cut needs to be made, it will be done later.

The council is the first of many groups who visit the commissioners this time of year about money.
