Civil Rights Comprehensive Notification for Oberlin **Unified School District No. 294.** 

In compliance with the Executive Order 11246; Title II of the Education Amendments of 1976; Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, as amended by the Equal Employment Opportunity Act of 1972; Title IX Regulation Implementing Education Amendments of 1972; Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973; and all other Federal, State, School rules, laws, regulations and policies, the Oberlin Unified School District No. 294 shall not discriminate on the basis of sex, race, color national origin, or handicap in the educational programs or activities which it operates.

It is our intent to comply with both the letter and spirit of the law in making certain that discrimination does not exist in its policies, regulations, and operations. Grievance procedures for Title IX and Section 504 have been established for students, their parents, and employees who feel discrimination has been shown by the local education agency.

# U.S.D. 294 **SPECIAL SERVICES**

State and federal court decisions and legislation have specified that all exceptional children have a right to a free, appropriate public education based on their needs. This means that U.S.D. 294 will identify all exceptional children; preschool as mandated, elementary and secondary, and provide the needed special education for these children in the most normal educational setting possible. Exceptional children are defined as mentally retarded, specific learning disabled, gifted, hearing impaired, language or speech impaired, personally and socially maladjusted, deaf-blind, visually impaired and physical and other health impaired.

All of these special education services are available through U.S.D. 294 or the Northwest Kansas Educational Service Center, of which U.S.D. 294 is a member. Specific steps in identifying and providing special education services are followed. All parent and student due process rights and confidentiality will be provided. All parents will be informed as soon as their child is referred for one of the special programs. Parents and, in some cases, the child, will be closely involved with the school's special service team decision. Parents may request a due process hearing. This is ordinarily not necessary if parents and school personnel work closely together for the child's benefit.

The state goals of an appropriate educational program for all exceptional students is a reflection of the philosophy of U.S.D. 294 to provide quality educational services for all children.
