Rules for getting driver's licenses changed Tuesday under bills passed this year by the Kansas Legislature.

Decatur County Treasurer Jean Hale said she attended a meeting in Hays for treasurers and driver's license examiners about the new rules at the beginning of the month.

She said Senate Bill 16 requires that every applicant for a driver's license or an identification card must provide their Social Security number or sign a waiver stating that for the standby military draft.


