Medicare paperwork headache for county

County Countdown

The Decatur County commissioners talked with the ambulance director about the paperwork sent in to request Medicare hearings so the service will get paid for work already done.

Director Patrick Pomeroy said a woman from Norton came here to help him with the Medicare billing. He said the process they are using is fine, but the resubmittals are where the problem is. Mr. Pomeroy said to resubmit bills, he has to get a form filled out by one of the doctors stating that the ambulance was needed on that call. He said he hadn't been

Commissioner Patricia Glenn asked if Mr. Pomeroy had heard anything back from Medicare on the paperwork already sent in.

Mr. Pomeroy said he hasn't heard anything. He said he plans to re-file with the notes from the doctors.

The commissioners looked at a catalog with Mr. Pomeroy for a light bar to go on top of the first response vehicle so that it will be more vis-


