# **Fall field dates have been set**

Fall field days have been set up so farmers can evaluate grain sorghum, sunflower and corn hybrids at three dryland sites, along with corn hybrids at two irrigated sites.

As of this writing, the corn is hanging in there. The field definitely needs a drink, but some hybrids will make corn.

At the dryland sites, there are 27 grain sorghum hybrids, 10 sunflower hybrids, and 29 corn hybrids from companies like AgVenture, Asgrow, Circle Seed Hybrids, Croplan Genetics, DeKalb, Fontanelle, Garst, Midwest Genetics, NC+Hybrids, Syngenta - NK, Triumph Seed, and UAP Pueblo.

Eleven grain sorghum herbicide programs and a comparison of either twin row corn or grain sorghum is also at each site. K-State also partnered with the Northwest Kansas Crop Residue Alliance to put on the Cover Your Acres field day at Norcatur.

The following will also be at the Cover Your Acres site: nitrogen study in corn, phosphorus study in grain sorghum, rainfall simulator, sunflower herbicide evaluation, forage sorghums, and dealer displays. At dinner, Bob Wolf, a K-State Extension engineer, who will speak on spray application technology.

The Cover Your Acres field day will be held from 2-9 p.m. on Tuesday, Aug. 19, two miles west of Norcatur. The registration fee is \$25. Sop by your local extension office to pick up a form, or look in the newspaper.

Unfortunately, the dry weather has caused the cancellation of the other two dryland field days. These

were to be on August 20, three miles south of Hoxie and 0.5 west, and on August 21, nine miles south of Gove. Not even the grain sorghum is surviving at these sites.

There are two irrigated field days scheduled, from 9 a.m. to noon Wednesday, Aug. 20, a mile north of Grainfield along K-23, and on Thursday, Aug. 21, from 9 a.m. to noon three miles northeast of Almena along K-383. 
fullness, the world and those who dwell therein." (NKJV)
