Oat varieties bring in great yields

If we can all remember back to this past spring when temperatures were mild and rainfall was fairly plentiful, all of the summer crops like wheat, barley, and oats were looking good. Many oat fields were cut for hay, while some were cut for

At the K-State Research and Extension Center in Colby, a spring oat performance test was conducted, and the oat variety Jim from Minnesota won with a yield of 67.9 bushels per acre. The rest of the top five were Blaze from Illinois at 66.7, INO9201 from Indiana at 66.2, Don from Illinois at 65.0, and Rodeo from Illinois at 64.4 bushels per acre. Other yields from commonly grown oat varieties in our area were Bates from Missouri at 59.7 and Jerry from North Dakota at 46.6. The average yield for the test was 58.4

As farmers start deciding what to do with their failed acres of corn or grain sorghum, they should think of spring oats as a viable alternative to planting wheat this fall. Waiting until spring will allow them to see if the area has had a wet winter with a forecast of a wet spring. With a wet winter, planting a crop like

grain sorghum may look more attractive than it does right now.

If the extended forecast is unfavorable, spring oats may be a more viable option. Wheat should probably be planted on a majority of acres, but with the spring oat option, producers will have more of an opportunity to take advantage of favorable weather, if any, for some of their acreage. 
