## Man pleads guilty in murder

A Norton man waived his right to a trial by jury on Friday and pleaded guilty to second-degree murder in the May killing of his step-father.

Jimmy D. Williams, 21, had been charged with first-degree murder for killing Bill Masden, on May 31 with a claw hammer.

The plea bargain brought the der, a lesser but still serious offense. District Court Judge Bill Elliott asked County Attorney Doug Sebelius to give him the facts of the case.

Mr. Sebelius said the defendant left J. Gregory's, a bar on State Street at 2 a.m. on May 31. At about 2:30 a.m., the he went to the residence of Bill Masden, 111 S. Ar-

Wearing latex gloves, he said, the defendant used a claw hammer on Mr. Masden, hitting him 12 or 13 times. Mr. Sebelius said the defendant has acknowledged using the claw hammer and killing Mr. Mas-

Mr. Williams' attorney, David Baumgartner, said he planned to file a motion for departure from sentencing guidelines.

There were two types of departure, Judge Elliott said. The first, durational, asks the court to give a jail term less than what Kansas sentencing guidelines suggest. The second, dispositional, asks the court to give a non-prison sentence.

Judge Elliott said in either case, it was up to Mr. Williams to convince him that a departure should be

Mr. Williams could serve anywhere from 147 months (12 years and three months) up to 653 months (more than 54 years, five months) in prison and could be fined up to \$500,000.

After questioning the defendant, Judge Elliott accepted his plea.

A sentencing hearing is set for 1:30 p.m. on Monday, Sept. 15, at the Norton County Courthouse befire Judge Elliott. Until that time, Mr. Williams will remain in the Norton County Jail.
