School group forms

Ten people worked on forming the Decatur Community Educational Foundation on Friday afternoon at the Oberlin School District

After the first meeting at the beginning of the month, letters were sent out to announce that Gary Tunnison, from Lincoln, Neb., would return to help set up the foundation if those who got the letters were interested in returning. Ten of the two dozen did.

Of those, seven volunteered to serve on the board: Sheriff Ken Badsky; Jill Reichert, an accountant; Dr. Mark Olson, an Oberlin veterinarian; Colleen Rittman, secretary at the feed yard; Jane Gilliam, a financial consultant; Gary Allen, retired; and Paul Shields, an area

The foundation has already received its first donation with a \$25 check from Mr. Tunnison.

The consultant suggested the group start out with a name, then they should talk about a logo. Since the school emblem is the Red Devils, he suggested carrying that on. He said most foundations have five categories of donors, and each one has a name that ties in with the logo. For instance the donors who give \$25 to \$499 could be the Little Devils or those who give in the highest donation range could be the Big Devils.

Mrs. Reichert asked about using silver, gold and bronze. Mr. Tunnison said he doesn't suggest it, especially when the school is already associated with a logo that people know.

For federal requirements, said Mr. Tunnison, the foundation will have to incorporate. The group will also have to apply for tax-exempt status with the Internal Revenue Service, but they will give the foundation a three-year grace period to raise money.

The foundation, he said, will be using the school board's attorney, Allen Shelton.

Mr. Tunnison said the board will also need to come up with a written motto, a positive statement which goes on every mailing.

He also went over the memory book which is a \$10 donation for people who have died. It is a way to pay tribute to someone. With the \$10 donation the person is then listed in the newsletter under the memory book with the year they graduated and who is honoring

One of the most important things, he said, is that every time a donation comes in, not to let more than 24 hours pass before a thank you letter goes out.

Donations should be tracked in an computer program. He said the foundation can have a website, list the donors and allow them to track where the money has been or will be spent.

Dr. Olson said the community has a strong alumni list with around 5,000 living graduates. Mr. Tunnison said each one should be sent an envelope so they can give. The foundation will never get any money unless the group asks, he

Mr. Tunnison also talked to the group about investment policies and fund raising.

The foundation will hold the next meeting from 11 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. Tuesday, Dec. 16, at the district office. At that time officers will be elected, the board will be selected. and articles of incorporation and bylaws will be adopted.
